Special to The Tribune. Oct. 28.—The hunt for James Gemmell, who was shot in the saloon at Park City on Friday while trying to hold a woman, came to a sudden and unexpected end this evening, when the man was found in the cellar of his residence on Marsac avenue, in his brain.

Refuge in Cellar.

A family had been away from and on their return found the cellar fastened and the outside door closed. Mr. Shields forced the door and found the body of the man lying in a pool of blood. The officers were notified and the coroner sent for.

Blows Out Brains.

Mr. Gemmell, it is thought, had killed the woman and fled to the cellar to escape. He was found in the cellar with a bullet wound in his forehead and a pool of blood on the floor. He was dead when found.
