

CHURCH DEDICATED Elaborate and Beautiful Ceremonies Mark the Occasion on Sunday.

WORSHIPERS STAND DURING SERVICES One Thousand Persons Present, Most of Whom Were Natives of Greece.

With solemn ceremonies, as elaborate as they were beautiful, the Greek Orthodox church of this city was dedicated yesterday morning in the presence of a thousand worshippers, most of whom were native Greeks.

During the entire service, which began at 8 o'clock in the morning and continued until after noon, the Greek worshippers, according to the custom of their church, stood up.

Another strange feature to the American mind is the sprinkling of water on every one in the congregation, when the offering was taken. The American worshippers, however, asked to be excused.

Will Long Stand as Epoch. To the Greeks of the international region the completion of this church and its dedication yesterday will long stand as an epoch in their history.

Beautiful Decorations. The interior of the church, although not yet completed in its decorations, is beautiful. The altar, on which none may step save the priest, is closed off by the railing of the choir.

Greek Consul Speaks. At 8 o'clock in the morning the priest and the trustees of the Greek community of Utah held a meeting at the church.

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WHO MAKE VOTE COMING ELECTION. Every citizen of the United States (male or female) of the age of 21 years or over, who shall have been a citizen of this State for one year, in the county-four months, in the precinct sixty days next the election, shall be entitled to vote.

YOU MUST REGISTER IN ORDER TO VOTE. Those Who Moved Since Presidential Election Register or Transfer.

As to Aliens. An alien becomes a citizen by naturalization through the courts; the receipt of what are commonly called "papers" does not make an alien a citizen.

Who Are Citizens. Children of naturalized parents were dwelling in the United States under the age of 21 years, and whose parents are citizens, are citizens of this State.

Salts Lake City Precinct. The fifty-three election districts in Salt Lake City constitute the City Precinct. Salt Lake City is divided into 53 wards, each of which elects two councilmen for the four-year term and one for year term.

Electoral Districts in Ward. The first municipal ward election district is from 1 to 11, the second from 12 to 22, the third from 23 to 33, the fourth from 34 to 44, and the fifth from 45 to 53.

Voters Must Register. Voters who did not register for the Presidential election will be required to register for the municipal election.

Must Register Again. A voter who registered in the Presidential election, but moved from the election district, must register in the new district.

Transfer Certificate. It will be more convenient for a voter to register in his new district to another will secure a transfer certificate.
