A new variety is the baby doll that talks, the doll is seated in a miniature baby buggy and as the carriage is wheeled it will stretch out its arms and "talk."

MRS. ROGERS LAID TO REST

Early Morning Funeral for Seafold's Victim.

HOOSICK FALLS, N. Y., Dec. 9.—The body of Mary Mabel Rogers, who was executed at Windsor, Vt., yesterday, was placed in a vault at St. Mary's cemetery here early today, preparatory to the interment in the presence of the family at 6 o'clock this morning.

It had been generally supposed that the body would be brought over the Boston & Maine railroad to the station here last night, and several hundred persons had gathered at the depot.

To avoid this crowd, friends of the Rogers family appealed to the railroad officials to have the train stopped at Hoosick. This was done and the body removed from the baggage car at that station, where it was taken in charge by undertakers. The casket was placed in a wagon and driven to the cemetery.

It had been planned to make an immediate interment, but at the last moment this plan was abandoned and the body placed in a vault to remain there until the interment at 6 o'clock, when the wish of relatives and friends for a final opening of the casket was granted. Meantime the vault was secured and an armed guard remained in charge. Awaiting the funeral party at the cemetery were Rev. Francis A. McCranor, Kathryn Callahan and a sister of the dead woman, a brother, Louis, and a few intimate friends of the family.

EDUCATING FARMERS

Union of Agriculturists Hold Meeting in Texas.

TEXARKANA, Ark., Dec. 9.—The convention of the Farmers' Educational Union of America adopted a constitution yesterday and elected its officers. A per capita tax is placed at 5 mills. It was decided that the lawyers and doctors in the country or unincorporated towns and newspaper men might become members.

G. P. Pyle of Texas was elected president by acclamation; W. A. Morris, Alabama, vice-president; R. H. McCulloch, Arkansas, secretary-treasurer; Newton Gresham, Texas, national organizer; J. H. Roak, Missouri, doorkeeper; E. R. Bell, George, sergeant-at-arms. The executive committee has the naming of a national headquarters and will choose between Dallas, Tex., and Little Rock, Ark.

BOYCOTT SPREADS AGAIN

Steamer Employees Forbidden to Buy American Goods.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 9.—The anti-American boycott has reached this port. It is the custom of the Pacific Mail company to allow peddlers and other small dealers on board their China liners during the luncheon hour for the convenience of the Chinese sailors, firemen, cooks and waiters, who, by reason of the exclusion act, may not do their shopping ashore.

When the Manchuria docked on Tuesday last, notices in Chinese were tacked up all over the ship. These notices called the attention of the Manchuria's crew to the existence of a boycott against American goods and forbade them to buy any wares offered for sale on the liner's decks during her stay in this American port.

So far, the Manchuria's Chinese have followed the edict of the boycott notice to the letter and the dealers have abandoned their efforts to trade with them.

NIPSIC FOR PRISON SHIP

Old Frigate to Go Into Commission on Puget Sound.

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 9.—The old frigate Nipsic, at one time the queen of the American navy, and the only American to escape the typhoon at Ania, Samoa, in 1859, is to go into commission at the Puget sound navyyard on December 23 as a prison ship.

For a number of years the Nipsic was used as a receiving ship at the navyyard, but was taken out of commission when the cruiser Philadelphia was built for that service. Her hull being good and with her great beam, the Navy department decided to make her a prison ship, which is badly needed at the yard.

Rains Help Sugar Crop.

HAVANA, Dec. 9.—The rains which have prevailed in Cuba for the past ten days will, it is believed, help the winter sugar crop. They have, however, destroyed much of the growing tobacco crop in the richest portions of the province of Pinar del Rio.
