RED AND BLACK KNOW ONLY VICTORY

In Year Now Closing Have Won Everything in Athletics.

NEXT YEAR BRINGS THE SUPREME TEST

Veterans of Many Battles Graduate, Leaving Big Holes to Be Filled.

The most successful athletic year in the history of the high school was that which came to a close on last Friday. The high school teams in all branches of athletics attained a rank of standing which it is safe to say has not been equaled by another school in the country. Everything from football to track contests was taken by the Red and Black warriors in a manner which gave them supremacy not only in the State but also in the Northwest. In all branches they came out with champion teams.

Reach Highest Rank.

The process of building up the teams has been going on for four years, ever since the senior class which graduated last night came into the school and brought the material which has made the high school athletes famous. Last year they had fairly good success in their athletics but were not given a chance to show just how much genuine sporting blood they had. They got into condition, though, and this year swept everything of their class clear out of the map.

Five Victories on Gridiron.

In football for the first time they were given a chance to see how they stood with teams of rank outside Utah, and they discovered by beating Pueblo, the crack Colorado team, and Butte, the Northwestern champions, that they are in a good way to some day capture the whole Western championship.

During the whole of the football season there was not a single team that had strength enough to score against them. Ogden, Pueblo, Butte, All Hallows college and Collegiate Institute, all fell under the charge of the Red and Black. In track they came out on top, also, by placing eleven of the State high schools in the rear. They are by capturing the State high school championship and carried off the pennant by winning all but one game played during the season.

Test Coming Next Year.

Next year is the one which is going to be the genuine test for the high school. In the graduating class which left the high school last night were ten of the greatest athletes that ever attended the high school. They are by name, Lyman Judson, Henry Richardson, Will Harris, Francis Critchlow, Scott Morris, Lauby, Arthur Stenhouse, George Roberts, Endicott Hall and Micky Howard. Six of these men were on the coaching team last year, which means new and green men for these six places. Then there are five of the other football men who have dropped out of the school, and it is doubtful if they will return next season.

Games With Butte and Pueblo.

This means practically a new football team for next year. The conquests next season are to extend over the same territory as last year. Word has been received from Pueblo stating that they intend to take Salt Lake to their city next season, and the locals intend to bring Butte here for a game on Thanksgiving. Then there will be the usual games within the State.

Best Players Graduate.

The greatest loss to the school will be Judson, who has made his name famous in athletics. As a fullback in football, a short distance sprinter in track work, and a pitcher on the baseball team, Judson has never before been equaled. Others who have made names for themselves in high school athletics, and who will be greatly missed in the future, are Roberts, Harris, Critchlow, Richardson and Morris.

These boys will no doubt be heard of in college athletics before many years. Judson and Harris have decided to go back to Cornell for their college work. They will both enter athletics. Critchlow, the speedy tackle, is going to Princeton, but does not at present intend to go in for athletics. Richardson, Roberts and Morris will go up to the University of Utah, and all intend to enter both football and track. It is highly probable that they will make good in both.

New Men Next Year.

The prospects for track next year are very brilliant at present, as most of the men will be new hands at track athletics. Baseball looks somewhat brighter. There will be several of the old line back in the ranks for work, but about four of the most prominent ones will be elsewhere.

Success Due to Callahan.

The great success of the high school in athletics during the season is due to a large extent to the work of D. A. Callahan, who took charge of all the branches of athletics and filled the boys brim full of enthusiasm, ginger, and science. He worked patiently, taking time from his work, and all for the love of good high school athletics. There has been some doubt as to whether Mr. Callahan will take charge of athletics at the school next year, because of the great demand it makes on valuable time which should be given to business. High school students are hoping, however, that Mr. Callahan will see his way clear to resume his old task when school opens in September.

MICHIGAN WINS CONFERENCE MEET

Scores Highest Total of Points in History of Association.

CHICAGO, June 2.—A new world's record in the pole vault and the equalling of the best previous mark in the 100-yard hurdles marked the sixth annual meeting of the Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association, held on Northwestern field at Evanston this afternoon. The University of Michigan team, as had been expected, took first honors, scoring the overwhelming total of 62 4-5 points. The University of Chicago was second and Iowa State Normal third.

New Record in Pole Vault.

Leroy Samee of Indiana university, by vaulting 12 feet 4 1/2 inches, established a new world's record for the event. Carrisa of Michigan tied the 100-yard hurdle record of 15 1-5 seconds, and in addition won first places in the 200-yard hurdles and the discus throw and second in the shot put. He scored 13 points for his school.

Dark Horse Wins Dashes.

F. Hamilton, an unheralded sprinter from Iowa State Normal, won both the dashes and landed his school in third place.

A detailed account of the meet follows:

440-yard run—Merrill, Chicago, first; Walker, Wisconsin, second; Bliscout, Wisconsin, third. Time, 30 seconds.

100-yard dash, final heat—Hamilton, Iowa Normal, first; Stewart, Michigan, second; Merrill, Chicago, third. Time, 19 1-5 seconds.

100-yard dash, final heat—Jarvis, Michigan, first; Hodgen, Minnesota, second; Shauer, Northwestern, third. Time, 15 1-5 seconds, which equals the world's record.

Discus throw, distance 136 feet one-half inches—Garrett, Michigan, first; Parry, Chicago, second; distance 135 feet 4 inches; Messmer, Wisconsin, third, 125 feet 6 1/2 inches.

200-yard dash, final—Hamilton, Iowa State Normal, first. Time, 32 3-5 seconds.
