ARE PLEASED HE SIGNED THE BILL Sugar Interests Are Said to Be Benefited by Removal of Alcohol Tax.

Both Utah and Idaho are said to be satisfied by President Roosevelt signing the bill removing the revenue tax from denatured alcohol. This tax, it is averred, has for years stood in the way of the development of one of the valuable by-products of the sugar industry.
