

THIS REGION HAS ESCAPED A BOOM

Siegel Consolidated Company Has Been Operating Three Years Without Noise.

BRAVED LONG HAUL TO MARKET OUTPUT

Thoroughly Equipped Company is Reaping Benefits From Work Well Done.

General Manager H. L. Siegel of the Siegel Consolidated Mining company left Thursday evening for the property in Nevada. The Siegel Consolidated company has been pursuing a remarkable course of development upon their Nevada possessions, and about which scarcely a word has been allowed to reach the public ear.

Braved a Long Haul.

The Siegel company owns about thirty claims located twenty-five miles due east from Cherry Creek, the character of the ground demanding development by means of tunnels entirely. Up to the present time there are seven tunnels in all, the longest being in a distance of 850 feet.

Large Monthly Production.

Manager Siegel states that the company at the present time is moving at the rate of \$15,000 net a month, and upon the dumps of the property are in the neighborhood of 2000 tons of ore of characteristic richness. The Siegel company expects to total their output this year to \$150,000, and the character of the resources and improving transportation facilities are combining to greatly simplify the problems confronting the management.

Never Had a Boom.

The Siegel district never has had a boom, although the nature of the ore resources and extent of territory to be covered have always presented great inducements for the inquisitive mind. The company has been pegging away without any ostentation, and is now at the stage where results are being obtained. An instance of the thorough manner in which this organization is proceeding is the fact that the company owns a nearby ranch of 160 acres, upon which practically all the supplies for the large force of men employed at the mine are raised. The water supply from this ranch leaves nothing to be solved in that line.

Lley Humphries of the John Hays Hammond staff of experts, who is the consulting engineer for the Siegel Consolidated, is in Salt Lake at the present time. Mr. Siegel will be absent for over a week.

LEADZONES ARE TAKEN FROM DUMP

Salt Lake Organization Begins Working Over Tailings of Con. Mercur.

VAST TONNAGE IS ALREADY PURCHASED

Company Will Make Further Additions as Success of Project Expands.

A battle royal is on between the stubborn holdings of the Consolidated Mercur company and an organization of Salt Lake mining men of prominence, armed with the latest approved scientific appliances. For at least eighteen years the dumps of the Consolidated Mercur company have defied all efforts to squeeze such values from them as the owning company were baffled in securing, but success never has perched long on the banners of those who had the temerity to attempt solving the problem. The latest attempt is being made by the Halderman Filter Tank company, their efforts having been started several days ago.

Salt Lickers Try Their Hand.

The Halderman Filter Tank company is composed of Salt Lickers of wide mining experience, the official family being Thomas Ferguson, president; Windsor Rice, vice-president; E. G. Kidder, secretary, and J. E. Gallagher, treasurer. By means of the Halderman process this company hopes to save at least 55 per cent of the remaining cyanide solution. Of the latter there are in the neighborhood of 600,000 tons, and the company has purchased outright this vast artificial storehouse of low-grade gold values.

Process to Be Used.

Perhaps the main hope for success by this new system is the improved methods of gathering the values in the agitation tank, an accessory to the process heretofore used to insure a more rapid filtration than heretofore accomplished. From the dumps the company transports 125 tons a day along the high trestle just completed. The ore is dumped into the Chilean mill along with the cyanide solution, and the ore is ground in this solution. From the mill the ore is taken into the sand tank, thence to a series of agitators, where it remains for from four to eight hours.

From the filtering tank the gold goes into the zinc boxes where it is precipitated. The plant is run by electricity, the equipment including two large motors, and while the equipment is absolutely complete the plant will not be ready to begin operations for a month. The company began making preparations for this work last December, the plant being the first unit. Should the quality of success follow the efforts anticipated by the organization, the company will begin operations on the largest scale possible.

Limbering Up Machinery.

At the present time the plant is handling about eighty-five tons a day, the capacity increasing as the machinery limbers up, and success so far has been attained. The company expects the plant to handle from 125 to 150 tons when everything is in perfect running order. This enterprise will be watched with considerable interest, as the handling successfully of so great a tonnage will mean no small financial results both for the operating company and the Consolidated Mercur as well.

GREAT BEND OPERATIONS.

Company Preparing to Drive Shaft to 500-Foot Level.

Manager James Davis of the Great Bend property of Goldfield has written to local interests that the recently installed hoist was working with perfection, and the management is preparing to begin operations on the 200-foot level. Not over sixty-five feet away from the point now reached in this working is the famous South vein, from which such phenomenal values were obtained on the surface. The extraction of ore of generous values still continues on the Great Bend, and it is still serving in the capacity as one of Goldfield's greatest producers and star attractions. The company is installing a system of pumps which will enable the sinking of the main shaft to the 500-foot level. Work to this end will be started within a short time. Great Bend has been from the earlier days of its history an attractive property. Salt Lickers, many of whom are extensively interested in the company.

LOYAL TO BEAVER.

Mining Man Preparing to Ship Ores to Salt Lake Market.

H. Miller, a prominent mining operator of Beaver county, whose home residence in that general region has inspired him with the utmost loyalty for the mineral future of Beaver, is in the city for the purpose of having tests made upon some samples of ore from his properties there. Mr. Miller has some fine claims adjoining the Burning Moscow and near the Talsman, and on his ground are several strong leads carrying high-grade silver and lead ores. The sampling of this ore during his present visit no doubt will be a prelude to some liberal shipments of ore from his properties to the local market.

G. H. ROBINSON'S SUCCESSOR.

Appointment Very Likely Will Await Return of Cooler Months.

It is not likely that a successor to George H. Robinson as managing director of the Tintic Mining and Development company will be selected by the directors of that organization until after the summer months are over. The board is badly scattered at present, several of the members being in Europe and others at the various vacation centers until the fall.

WORK BEING DONE WITH MUCH ENERGY

Granite Mining District Is Showing Up Some Very Fine Results.

BEAVER CITY, Utah, July 12.—Development work in the copper mines of the Granite district, ten miles west, is now being conducted with vigor and with much encouraging results. Robinson Bros. continue to take out for shipment generous quantities of high grade ore in the Oak Leaf mine at a depth of over 150 feet, at which point the pay ore vein is between 3 and 4 feet wide, and appears to grow stronger with sinking. It is already a settled fact that the Oak Leaf property is the making of a great producing mine, and the work now being done is to demonstrate that the output of ore can be made to meet the expense of development, and more, too, with the aid of a modern hoisting plant, which the owners hope to install before the season is over. What is true of the Oak Leaf is equally true in greater degree of several other mines in the district now in process of active development. And as far as Cherry Creek, and the inhabitants of that booming little mining center are making preparations to celebrate the occasion in a manner befitting the occasion.

Great Bismuth Mine.

About eight miles northeast of this city is the one genuine bismuth mine yet found in this State. It is owned by James Boytin et al. of Beaver, and has been opened on the surface for a long distance. The vein lies between Granite and porphyry and is shown to be 300 feet wide for a distance of over 200 feet. Samples taken of this product gives an average of 13 1/2 per cent bismuth and 60 cents gold to the ton. There are no other mines in the district unless it be a percentage of cobalt, which rare metal is usually found to be associated with bismuth, nickel, etc. Steps are being taken to have this mine properly sized, and if it be found that it contains cobalt in considerable quantity, the attention of the inventor, T. A. Edison, will be called to the fact, as it is known that he has found a new use for cobalt in the production of physical energy.

Edison After Mines.

It is a fact that Mr. Edison, during the past year, has been making inquiries for cobalt mines in the State of Utah and elsewhere. It is not, therefore, out of the question that Mr. Edison may yet become headquarters of the greatest cobalt-producing section of the West.

One of the most promising surface showings for a gold mine of gigantic proportions has recently been discovered about ten miles southeast of Beaver, and is owned by Tom Foster-Ingham and others, who are preparing to do some development work on the property. The vein on the surface is 50 feet wide and has been traced and opened in places for a distance of half a mile. Assays from the quartz on the surface go from \$2 to \$6 in gold. This great vein lies between granite and limestone and from appearances bids fair to rival any gold mine in the State in quantity, and undoubtedly depth will give it greater value. It is as fine a looking property as any found on the surface of Gold Mountain, the home of the Annie Laurie, Sevier Consolidated and other great gold producers, and may be said to be a distant neighbor, as it lies some miles due east of Gold Mountain.

Will Supply Large Mill.

The little work as yet done on this property shows it to be capable of supplying a large stamp mill with ore-bearing quartz for an indefinite period. Its location makes it an ideal spot for a mining camp, as there are timber and water in abundance for all purposes and is comparatively easy of access. It is regarded by mining men of experience as the greatest gold proposition yet found in southern Utah, and already capitalists are considering its taking over and development.

The interest being taken in the mining industry tributary to Beaver by The Tribune is greatly appreciated by the people and is giving an impetus to mine development greater than for years past in this portion of the country.
