HOW MERCHANTS OF SPOKANE ARE HIT

Some Interesting Testimony Brought Out in Second Day of Freight Rate Hearing.

LONGER HAULS FOR MUCH LOWER TARIFF

Unable to Compete With Wholesalers of the Coast Is the Evidence.

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 15.—Such rapid progress is being made in taking testimony in the suit of the city of Spokane to compel the railways to lower their freight rates from Eastern points that it is believed the hearing before the Interstate Commerce commission will be concluded by tomorrow night, so far as this city is concerned.

Commissioner C. A. Prouty, who presides, is promptly cutting out useless repetitions and technicalities. The city may conclude its evidence this afternoon, much of the testimony today being in reference to comparative rates and the distance to which Spokane jobbers can ship goods.

From present indications they will base their defense mainly on the theory of water competition compelling lower rates at coast points.

Commissioner F. K. Lane is expected to hold supplementary hearings on the Spokane rate case in Seattle, Portland and San Francisco, to enable shippers of those cities to present evidence to show that water competition requires lower rates to coast points than to interior cities.

SNOW DOES NOT AFFECT COAL SUPPLY

Railroads Now Bring From Thirty to Forty Carloads to City Daily.

NO REAL SUFFERING IN THE COMMUNITY

Scarcity of Labor Still Prevails and Sufficient Help Can Not Be Secured.

Fortunately the heavy snow storms of the past few days have not seriously interfered with coal supply for the city, and while the receipts of fuel do not reach the maximum by any means, the shortage is not any more serious than it has been in the past.

The dealers are from two to three weeks behind with the filling of their orders; they have no stores on hand at their yards; the daily orders are filled by shoveling the coal direct from the cars to the wagons; but this condition of affairs has prevailed for weeks, and it is no worse today than it has been heretofore.

There is no real suffering in the community; inconvenience there is, but under existing conditions that can easily be tolerated. If the city was to be beset by a long, continued cold spell, conditions would not be so comfortable, then some in the community would begin to feel the pinch of King Frost.

As to the supply, information given out at headquarters of the Rio Grande and Oregon Short Line is that strenuous efforts are being put forth to meet the demands as fully as possible. It is stated by Short Line officials that the daily supply of commercial coal brought to the city by that road, is from fifteen to twenty cars.

The scarcity of miners still prevails. There is employment in Utah for 500 or 600 men at the coal mines, but the help cannot be secured. The mines are being worked to the fullest capacity that the force will permit.

Cars that went East during the fall months are being rapidly returned—cars used in the beet and other industries are now being used in the coal trade.

There is still, however, a shortage of motive power and this hinders considerably the transportation of fuel. At the mines, especially those of the Utah Fuel Company, in Carbon County, there have been heavy snow falls, but the lines are not blocked and hence traffic is being carried on with little hindrance.


