land Cotton Mills Entitled to Lower Rates Than Southern Plants.

ATION MUST BE TAKEN IN CONSIDERATION

Mills Are More Favorably Situated as Regards Cotton-Producing Region.

TON, May 11.—A decision rendered today by the Interstate Commerce Commission in the case of the Manufacturing Company against the Georgia Railroad involving rates on cotton bales from the Southern coast terminals.

Commission is written by Commissioner against the complainant, that the higher freight rates on goods from points in the Pacific coast are justifiable. In its announcement Commissioner says:

That such rates from the States are higher than those from the New England, not in and of itself establishing the reasonableness of the higher conditions existing at the present time. INSPECTORS FOOLED

Most Expert Cannot Combat Mill Owners and Employees.

PITTSBURG, May 11.—After hearing several witnesses for the defense today, the trial of Jay J. Dunn and Charles L. Close, charged with furnishing defective boiler tubes for warships, was adjourned until Monday.

Mayor Coleman of McKeesport, formerly an inspector at the Shelby Tube works, said that he never placed any importance in hydrostatic test, as that test had been instituted for an entirely different kind of tube from the one in question.

Former Inspector Burdell testified to leaving the stamps in the desk at Greenville and that he identified tested tubes by the manner in which the stamp was placed upon them. He said it was possible for the most expert inspector to be deceived when a combination of mill owners and employees are working against him.

Commander W. W. White of the bureau of steam engineering at Washington said he was detailed to the trials of the Pennsylvania, Minnesota, Vermont and Maryland and examined their boilers after the trial runs. From the Pennsylvania 100 tubes were withdrawn, while the boiler tubes upon the other ships were examined by electric light without removal. None of the tubes examined, he said, had been found defective.

NATION'S GUESTS ARE WELL ENTERTAINED

President and Other Officials of Government Arrange Interesting Programme.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—The distinguished foreigners visiting this city as the guests of the United States were divided into two parties today. The larger one, composing most of the principal naval officers and a few foreign army officers, made a pilgrimage to the tomb of George Washington at Mount Vernon. The other party, composed mostly of army officers, went to Fort Myer and witnessed a special drill by a troop of the Thirtieth cavalry and a battery of field artillery. The drill was followed by a luncheon at the post.

Among those who went to Fort Myer were Maj. Wang Yu Chin and Capt. Wang Yen Pin of the Chinese army.

The trip to Mount Vernon was made up on the naval yacht Mayflower. Secretary Metcalf was the host of the occasion. His guests numbered about forty, and included General Kuraki and two other generals of the Japanese army; Vice-Admiral Iquin and a staff of the Japanese navy; the Japanese Ambassador, the principal officers of the Chilean navy, the naval attaches of the various embassies and legations, Capt. Li Ting Hsin and Lieut. Lin Sing Chwa of the Chinese navy and Rear Admiral Davis and other officers of the United States fleet in Hampton Roads.

The dinner at the White House this afternoon closed the official part of the entertainment of the present party of foreigners.

MARVIN INQUEST SECRET

Nothing Given Out as to Testimony Adduced at the Hearing.

DOVER, Del., May 11.—None of the testimony heard today by the coroner's jury, which is investigating the death of Horace Marvin, Jr., tended to reveal the truth. The inquest for some unknown reasons is private. Among the witnesses were Dr. Horace Marvin, the father of the boy; Ollie Pleasanton, a neighbor, who found the body; Joseph Webb, a farm hand on Dr. Marvin's place, and several other neighbors. The details of their testimony could not be learned.

HELD WITHOUT BAIL

Charles O. Rogers Alleged to Have Murdered Three Persons for \$16.

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., May 11.—Charles O. Rogers, who was arrested in Los Angeles after a year long chase on a charge of having murdered the two Olney brothers and Alice Ingerick near here in October, 1905, was arraigned today, and pleaded not guilty. He was remanded until October without bail.

The officers who brought Rogers from Los Angeles claim that he made a complete confession to them and declared that while robbery was the motive of the crime, he got only \$16.

HONORS OLD CHURCH

Memorial Building Over Walls of the Historic Jamestown Edifice.

NORFOLK, Va., May 11.—The Colonial Dames of America today dedicated the memorial church, erected over the excavated walls of the original church, built by the Jamestown settlers of the seventeenth century at Jamestown Island. President Tucker of the exposition made the presentation address, and Joseph Bryan of Richmond, Va., received the memorial on behalf of the Society for Preservation of Virginia Antiquities.

Mexican Commission Arrives

NORFOLK, Va., May 11.—The Mexican Governmental commission to the Jamestown exposition, composed of Colonel Manterola, Captain Fernandez, and Captain Lugo of the Mexican army and Lieutenant Carzo of the Mexican navy, arrived at the exposition today for a permanent stay until November for the purpose of witnessing army and navy features.

Taken Over By Foreclosure

TOLEDO, Ohio, May 11.—William H. H. Miller of Indianapolis, a special commissioner of the Federal court, to take the testimony in the foreclosure proceedings concerning the Ohio division of the Wabash railroad, today filed his report. The old Wabash, St. Louis and Pacific railroad was taken over by the Wabash system on a foreclosure sale.

Defaulting Teller Surrenders

CHARLOTTE, N. C., May 11.—Frank H. Jones, the defaulting teller of the Charlotte National bank, who is charged with having embezzled about \$70,000 of the bank's funds, and for whom a reward of \$3,000 was offered, arrived here today, and surrendered himself.

Charged With Child Murder

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 11.—Charged with having murdered a child last February by placing it under an outer doorstep until it froze to death, and then burning the body in a stove in their home, Catherine Ellenberger and her sister-in-law, Anna Goldman, are under arrest.
