Now, does he require papers to vote on, or does he not? Remember, the son was born in the old country (Scotland).

SUBSCRIBER.

(1) No stated amount; but one-half the earnings is exempt, and in case the earnings are but one dollar a day or less, all is exempt. (2) If the father became naturalized while the son was a minor, and if both have continuously resided in the United States, the son is a full citizen and can vote without taking out any papers.

A wins. The population of Chicago by the Federal census of 1900 (the latest enumeration made) numbered 1,698,575. The population of Utah was 276,749; of Nevada, 42,335; of Idaho, 161,772; of Montana, 243,329; of Wyoming, 92,531; a total of 1,167,716, or less than half of the population of Chicago that year. We might add Colorado, which with 538,700 inhabitants, Arizona with 122,931, and New Mexico with 195,310, a total for all the States named of 1,674,657, and still have less people than live in Chicago. It will be said, perhaps, that in the seven years since the census followed in these figures, these States have grown tremendously, which is true; but Chicago is a pretty swift-growing city itself, and it is not in the least likely that Utah, Nevada, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming have at the present time anywhere near as many inhabitants as Chicago.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

day's Tribune the following questions: Are persons applying to be registered, legally registered, who do not take the oath of affirmation and subscribe to the same mentioned in section 803 of the election laws, and in case they are not requested by the registry agent to take such oath or affirmation and subscribe to same, but are instructed to only sign their names on the poll-book, are they legally registered, and can they vote at the coming election? (2) Does section 804 in any manner qualify section 803 and make it optional with the registry agent in administering the oath or affirmation mentioned in section 803, and having same subscribed to, so long as he (the registry agent) is satisfied as to the qualifications of the person applying to be registered? (3) Is it sufficient to take the oath or affirmation and not subscribe to same? (4) When qualified voters have not taken the oath or affirmation in the manner required, can same be rectified after the last day of registration and prior to election day? If so, how? Does any negligence on the part of the registry agent entitle them to vote? A READER.

(1) Such persons may legally vote. (2) Section 804 merely provides the manner in which the registry agent may satisfy his mind as to the qualification of the applicant to register; it does not qualify section 803, which gives the form of oath to be taken. (3) Yes, if the registrar does not present the oath and asks the applicant to take and subscribe it; but if he presents the oath it must be subscribed as well as taken. (4) If the voter's name is on the registration list, the presumption is that he has made his case with the registrar, and nothing more is required of him or her; a voter cannot be successfully challenged because the registrar has not presented an oath to be taken and subscribed, or has lost or mislaid that oath; the intent and purpose of the law is to ensure legal elections and the purity of the ballot-box, not to disfranchise those who are legal voters and have done all that was asked of them to conform to the requirements of the statute.
