COMMON SENSE. Medicine is not of much use to cure consumption. Fresh air and clean living are the essential forces to combat the dread white scourge. Every precaution should be employed to prevent the germs from settling on the lungs, and coughs and colds should not be neglected. To break up a cold quickly and cure any cough that is curable, mix a half ounce Virgin Oil of Pine with two ounces of glycerine and a half pint of good whisky. Shake well and take a teaspoonful every four hours. Five ounces of tincture of Cinchona compound can be used instead of whisky with the same effect. This mixture will usually break up a cold over night. Care should be exercised to use only the genuine Virgin Oil of Pine, which is prepared in the laboratories of the Leach Chemical Co., Cincinnati, O., and put up for dispensing, only in 1/2-ounce vials, each securely sealed in a round wooden case. It is better to purchase the different ingredients separately and mix them at home.

BIG TAX COLLECTIONS AT TREASURER'S OFFICE. Delinquent taxpayers, who have the privilege of eliminating their names from the list up to closing time this afternoon, are paying up in lively fashion in the County Treasurer's office. The collections Thursday aggregated \$45,000. Friday the amount collected was \$40,000, and it is expected that at least \$50,000 will be paid in today.

DIVORCE MILL GRINDS SLOWLY BUT GRINDS MOST EXCEEDINGLY FINE. That admirable and popular piece of mechanism, commonly called the divorce mill, was apparently in good running order Friday afternoon, with Judge Charles W. Morse in charge, but the grists were few and far between. In fact, but one decree was granted, the remaining cases going over for various reasons.

The exception to the general rule was in the case of Susanna Gray against Archie Gray. Mrs. Gray told the court that she was married on June 8, 1905, since which time her husband had failed to keep the larder and clothes closet properly supplied. During the past year, she said, he had furnished her with no necessities whatever, although he was capable of earning from \$55 to \$60 a month. Upon corroborative testimony being given by Mrs. Gray's mother, the decree was ordered entered.

In Amy McGrath's action against Martin McGrath, Jr., on the ground of failure to support, C. Stanley Price, on behalf of McGrath, asked the court to set aside the default heretofore entered and permit the defendant to answer. This was objected to by Mr. Harrington, for the plaintiff, but the motion of Mr. Price was granted, the court remarking that he would always set aside a default in a divorce case when the defendant desired to contest the matter.

When the case of John Berger against Rose Berger was called, it was announced that the defendant's attorney, who is a resident of Denver, was not present, and a request was made by David M. Haigh that the matter be postponed for a reasonable time. It is said that the case will probably be settled out of court. The grounds are desertion, and the defendant is now a resident of Denver.

Marinda Loosli, who is seeking a divorce from Ernest Loosli on the ground of cruelty, was unable to appear in court on account of illness, and will unfold her tale to the court at a later date.

Clarence W. Taylor was present to show cause why a restraining order should be dissolved. Nellie R. Taylor, who is suing Taylor for divorce on the ground of cruelty, secured the order some time ago, but when the matter was called up yesterday, it was discovered that neither Mrs. Taylor nor her attorney was in court. As a result, Judge Morse ordered the restraining order dissolved without requiring Taylor to testify.

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CORDUROY TROUSERS FOR ENGINEERS ONLY Dress Reform Movement Among Students at University; Other Fine Distinctions.

Engineering students at the university are planning a reform in the dress of students attending the school. They purpose to allow none but engineers to wear corduroy trousers while on the campus at the school. Should others appear thus dressed, they will be sent to their classes in a pair of blue overalls, or perhaps something less. No action has been taken by the engineers as a body with regard to this new ruling, but there seems to be a strong sentiment in this branch of the student body to make such a rule. If this special dress programme is carried through as now scheduled, freshmen will not be permitted to wear high-top boots at school. Only sophomores, juniors and seniors are to be accorded this privilege.

Liquor Man Goes Free. The Sunday liquor selling case of Salt Lake City against Robert Wineman was dismissed by Judge Armstrong, Friday, on motion of Assistant City Attorney Dinny. The case was dismissed for the reason that important witnesses have left the State. Wineman was found guilty in Judge Diehl's court and appealed to the District court.
