CHICAGO, JUNE 16, G. O. P. CONVENTION

Republican National Committee Fixes Time and Place at Meeting Saturday.

KANSAS CITY WILL FIGHT FOR THE 1912 MEETING

Number of Delegates Allowed Each Territory Is Cut From Six to Two.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—"Chicago, June 16." The former is the place and the latter the time at which the Republican national convention for 1908 will be held. Both points were decided by the Republican national committee in conference at the Shoreham hotel in this city today. The meeting began at 10:18 a. m. and adjourned at 1:30 p. m., and at that time the claims of Chicago, Kansas City and Denver for the convention location were all pointedly presented by advocates of the various places. The vote stood 31 for Chicago, 18 for Kansas City and 4 for Denver, after which the Chicago choice was declared to be by acclamation.

The result was pleasantly received by all the members of the committee and even the Kansas City and Denver boomers, of whom there were sixty or seventy present, announced themselves as satisfied.

Selection of Date a Compromise. Kansas City declared, through her delegation, however, that she would "come back after it again in 1912 and would be sure to get it at that time." The selection of a date was a compromise between the first of June and the last of June, all being satisfied on that point also.

The committee, after an hour's debate, reached a compromise on the proposition as set forth in the call for the selection of delegates by primaries in States having laws prescribing that method of election by giving State and county committees authority to decide whether the primary election shall take the place of the election by convention, as in the past.

A report on the procedure for the election of delegates from Porto Rico and the Philippines provided for a call by territorial or central committees for an election of the choosing of two delegates. The method for such election was prescribed. William F. Stone, sergeant-at-arms, announced the appointment of David F. Cowan of Milwaukee as chief assistant sergeant-at-arms, and L. C. Hechinger of East Orange, N. J., chief confidential clerk.

Formal Call Comes Today. The formal call will be issued tomorrow. Regarding the method of electing delegates the call provides that delegates from the State at large shall be elected in conventions called by the respective State committees; that Congressional delegates and alternates shall be elected by district conventions called by the district Congressional committee; or providing that delegates both State and district alternatives may be elected under the laws of any State provided by the State committee or Congressional committee.

The call of 1905 gave six delegates to the Republican convention from each Territory, including Alaska. The present call reduces the number in each case to two.

COLISEUM IDEAL FOR CONVENTION PURPOSES

CHICAGO, Dec. 7.—The Coliseum is one of the most perfect halls for convention purposes in the country. It is constructed almost entirely of steel and is practically fireproof. The seating capacity now is about 12,000, and with the addition of two new balconies, which it is expected will be built for the convention, the hall will easily accommodate 14,000 persons. The dimensions of the main hall are 300x175 feet. There is an annex 400 feet long and the dimensions of which are 75x175 feet. Telegraph and press facilities are of the best.
