ASK RECEIVER FOR PASSAIC STEEL COMPANY

TRENTON, N. J., Dec. 30.—Application was made this afternoon for appointment of a receiver for the Passaic Steel company of Paterson, N. J. The application was made by Joseph O'Brien and Michael Martin of Scranton, Pa., who hold \$5,000 of the \$2,500,000 of the company's 5 per cent gold bonds issued in October, 1902.

They charge that interest on the bonds was not paid in October, 1906, April, 1907, and October, 1907, and that the company is in arrears to the city of Paterson for taxes to the amount of \$45,000.

The Passaic Steel company was organized under the laws of New Jersey, and has an authorized capital of \$6,000,000.

Counsel for other bondholders have asked for postponement of the case to permit a reorganization committee of bondholders to perfect their plans.

STANDS BY JEWS AND CUTS OUT "SHYLOCK"

EL PASO, Tex., Dec. 30.—In consequence of the action of School Superintendent G. P. Putnam in eliminating "The Merchant of Venice" from the English course in the El Paso high school at the request of Rabbi Martin Zielonka of the Jewish congregation, the Ministers' union today filed a vigorous protest against what they term "sectarian interference with the school."

The school board will meet Monday to consider the question whether the superintendent's action shall be sustained or not.
