SHORT LINE TO BUILD BRANCH FROM RUPERT

Will Tap Twin Falls North Side Project and Connect With Main Road.

The Oregon Short Line has decided to start work this spring on its proposed branch line from Rupert, Idaho, to Fuller, Idaho, the first station west of Gooding on the main line, according to advices received here Monday from Rupert.

It has been known for some time that the Oregon Short Line was considering the construction of this branch, a proposed route having been surveyed last summer.

Notice has been sent out, however, to the stockholders of the Minidoka & Northwestern railroad, a subsidiary company of the Oregon Short Line, which owns a line from Minidoka to Buhl, Idaho, that on February 29 a meeting will be held at Pocatello to amend the articles of incorporation of the company that can construct and own the proposed line from Rupert to the main line of the Oregon Short Line.

According to the preliminary survey made last summer the proposed branch will leave the main line at Rupert and run west through Jerome and Fulmer, coming back to the main line at Fuller.

GROSSCUP ARRAIGNED ON CRIMINAL CHARGE

CHARLESTON, Ill., Feb. 24.—Judge Peter S. Grosscup, presiding Judge of the United States Circuit court at Chicago, with several other directors, officers and employees of the Central Illinois Traction company, was arraigned today before Judge M. W. Thompson in the Chicago County Circuit court on charges of criminal negligence and manslaughter.

The defendants arraigned with Judge Grosscup were Arthur W. Underwood, Francis S. Peabody and Marshal W. Sampson, all of Chicago, and all directors of the company. President H. C. Potter, Chicago, Supt. Fred M. Moore, Charleston and Motorman E. F. McClara and Charles C. Charleston.

The eight men were indicted as a result of the interurban collision on mile west of Charleston on the Charleston & Madison interurban line on August 30, 1907. A heavily-loaded passenger car bound for Charleston with visitors to the county fair crashed into a house on a steep grade. Eighteen persons were killed and fifty-three injured in the collision.

All the accused pleaded "not guilty." Formal motion to quash the indictments was made in each case.

CALLS GERMAN MENACE TO PEACE OF WORLD

CHICAGO, Feb. 24.—"Germany has become a menace to the peace of the entire civilized world," declared Dr. Emil Ruedemann, at a national assembly here today. "That nation has lent a willing ear to the doctrine denying the equality of men."

"The doctrine that pernicious doctrine taken root that now it is a settled conviction among the strong men of the nation that even those born in that country are not real Germans unless they have Teutonic blood in their veins. The doctrine is the offspring of selfish and ungodly ideas."

"This selfish doctrine has started to spread to America, and too often we see the American citizen, who is free from the very ones whose fathers and mothers were emigrants."

By the arrangement ten more seats, nearly one hundred more seats will be provided for the press at the convention this year than were provided for them at the convention in 1904.

FINANCIAL STRINGENCY IS ACUTE IN JAPAN

It is believed that the Japanese government is transferring from London to Tokyo of a large portion of Japanese balances and making a large transfer of money to the Japanese government. Japan's balances in London are estimated as between \$60,000,000 and \$70,000,000. At the Japanese embassy here news is being passed that the Japanese government is paying out money to the Japanese government and is discredited, but private advices to German firms trading in Japan are that the Japanese government is in a state of financial stringency in the United States is believed to be affecting the Japanese government.
