

RUSH VALLEY IS THE SMELTER SITE

Reasons Advanced Why This Section Is Adapted to Smelting Plants.

WATER IS PLENTIFUL AND FARMERS SCARCE

Citizen of Vernon Believes Main Chance Is Being Sadly Neglected.

A prominent citizen of Vernon, Utah, has presented a number of very logical reasons why Rush Valley, this State, should receive attention from the smelting organizations as one ideal location, within easy reach of the world, for the smelting plants which have been having such a hard time of it in the vicinity of Salt Lake City. These reasons follow:

By reading an article recently published in The Tribune on the smelter matter, I thought of Rush Valley and its advantages. "First—The Salt Lake route runs through the valley from the north to the south end, nearly forty miles. The Lehi branch runs through the southeast end of the valley and connects with the main line near Boulder Summit. The valley has an average width of about ten miles to the base of the mountains. It is reported on good authority that the Salt Lake route is going to build a railroad to Deep Creek and Nevada points as soon as possible. This road will open up a great belt of low grade ore and considerable high grade ores between here and Nevada. The mining regions are also situated near the main line of the Salt Lake route.

The Rio Grande Western can easily build into Rush Valley from their Tinche branch or from Lehi, and there is also plenty of room for others to come in if necessary. A branch of railroad can be built through this valley at a minimum cost to line quarries and other facilities for smelter use. Two of the greatest lime quarries in the State that supply the smelters with lime rock are located in Rush Valley. There are three good streams of water and several springs of smaller size to be had. The water is pure and in abundance from ten feet down, according to the elevation of the ground. From wells that have been dug in the valley, it is found there are also good reservoir sites to save the flood waters.

As to the agricultural interests of this valley, they are very small compared with other sections of the State. The climatic condition of this valley is said to be ideal for raising such crops as wheat and corn, and such vegetables can be successfully grown here, compared with the rest of the State's farming sections. Now, if all the smelter companies that are doing business in this State could unite and buy out all of the farms and the farming interests in Rush Valley and take the whole valley for smelter purposes and by building all the smelters toward the middle of the valley, the smoke would not go beyond the boundaries of the valley to do any harm. It would be a great benefit to the State at large and to the smelting interests as well, for they could select some locality to build all of their smelters where they would not injure a great tract of good farming land and the good farming land of Utah is not too plentiful at best, and this ought to be left for the home-maker to raise supplies for the working people of the State. The farmers, miners and smelters ought to work more to each other's interest and for the benefit of the State. The farmers and smelters should build one smelter here and another somewhere else until we have them scattered all over the State, and each one destroy four or five square miles of farming land around them. There will be continual litigation and overhauling trouble.

It is also an indisputable fact that all true Americans love their homes; we love to improve and beautify them, and our own use and posterity and the use of the State. The farmers and smelters can not work together peaceably in the same locality, and it is impossible to build all of the smelters from where it is, why not build the smelters on some of the poor land like Rush Valley, where they will do no harm?

Extent Unknown, but Find Looks Like Something Good Is Due.

Word from Alta, Wednesday, was to the effect that the upraise driven from the 400-foot level of the Columbus Consolidated property had broken into ore that was extremely fine rock. Superintendent A. O. Jacobson, who has been fighting against an attack of the gripe for several days at his Salt Lake home, stated to The Tribune that the report was true, although not enough work had been accomplished yet to determine the real extent of the chute. That it will make into a chute is his firm conviction, as the upraise went through lime shale to the white liming which always accompanies ore.

The white liming, he states, shows that the management has encountered the contact, and the chute was made within the next few feet, or it may be necessary to drift to the point of intersection. He states that the company has almost installed the new triple pump on the 400-foot level, which will take care of all the water from now on that may make in the lower levels. This pump weighs 42,000 pounds, its capacity is 500 gallons of water a minute, and it is driven by a 75-horsepower motor.

The Utah Copper company presents such a tempting proposition for mining students in the East that their desire to write columns regarding this company is pardonable, even if they do sometimes swerve from the actual facts in good faith. NO DEFINITE WORD FROM OHIO COPPER

There is an absolute dearth of news regarding the interesting process of financing the Ohio Copper, nothing having been received from the East since the stockholders' meeting which was held in Maine on the 7th of the month. Local stockholders are awaiting notification of another meeting which will, in all probability, be held should the plans as rumored go through. These plans, if they will be recalled, were to the effect that the Bingham Consolidated stockholders were to surrender their stock to the Ohio Copper company with \$12 cash, for which they were to receive one share of Eagle & Blue Bell stock and four and two-thirds shares of Ohio Copper stock.

This would provide the means of liquidating the debts of the Bingham Consolidated company, which are stated to amount to over three-quarters of a million dollars, providing at the same time the necessary capital for financing the new mill of the Ohio Copper company in completed shape for operation. The fact that this plan would increase the capitalization of the Ohio Copper creates little or no alarm in local circles. The mine is worth double the present capitalization, and the main thing desired is confirmation of some logical plan which will serve the purpose of placing the Ohio on an operating and paying basis.

SMELTERS NOW ARE AFTER THE BUSINESS

One buyers in this region are now prepared to take all the ore they can get. It is said, but operators are apparently in a hurry to resume production so long as the metal market remains at its present stage. And yet metals are not so low as they were four years ago, when the mines were working and operators appeared reasonably well satisfied. It is true that general expenses are somewhat higher now than they were when metals were before low in price. The Utah Mine Owners' association has a movement under way to obtain concessions from railroads, smelters and others, which, without bearing hard upon any one interest, will enable the mines to produce with a profit.

The American Smelting and Refining company, it is known, is making substantial concessions in some quarters, compared with the terms exacted when the slump in metals first became serious. —Ely Expositor.
