Board of Public Works Authorizes Work to Cost \$16,000.

GREGORY'S HELD ON A SERIOUS CHARGE

Government Secret Service Men Find Dies and Moulds in Home.

MUST NOW ANSWER FOR HAVING COUNTERFEIT TOOLS

Is Under Additional Bond of \$2500; Still in Custody.

Eben J. Gregory, now being held on a charge of "sweating" gold coins to await the action of the Federal grand jury, was arraigned before United States Commissioner Charles S. Baldwin Saturday afternoon and bound over on a new charge of having dies and moulds in his possession for the purpose of making counterfeit coins. In default of a \$2500 bond Gregory was again returned to the county jail. He must now raise \$5000 in bonds before he can be released.

The grand jury found in the attic of Gregory's home when they returned there Friday to further investigate the outfit which he is said to have used in the sweating operations. The presence of these counterfeit moulds in the attic of Gregory's home was not suspected until the morning that he had confined his operations to "sweating" gold coins. So far there is no evidence to show that Gregory did anything but "sweat" coins. The discovery of the counterfeit moulds is the result of a thorough search which the two Government secret service men made of the den before finally leaving it.

Pleads "Not Guilty." United States Marshal William Spry was in charge of Gregory when he was brought before Commissioner Baldwin at 11:30 o'clock. Gregory entered a plea of not guilty when the charge was read. He asked for an immediate hearing. The case was set for 1:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

The Government placed Richardson and Frazer upon the stand. These men testified of their find the previous day. The moulds were placed in evidence. One set of dies and moulds is a metal affair for making silver dollars of 1901 coinage; another plaster mould and die are for making silver half dollars of 1898 coinage. Other paraphernalia was also found in the attic. These moulds were introduced as evidence.

The defense placed W. S. Bing, manager of the Salt Lake Stamp company, upon the stand. Bing was expected to testify that the moulds could not be used to make a counterfeit coin. He declared, however, that counterfeit coins could be made, but that they would be poor ones.

Bailey & Vickery, who represented Gregory in his former hearing, were also his attorneys Saturday. The Government was represented by District Attorney H. E. Booth and William S. McCrea. Gregory was busy all Saturday afternoon after the trial endeavoring to raise bonds. He was unsuccessful, but will make another attempt Monday to secure funds to insure his release.

The Federal grand jury, which is to investigate the charges against Gregory in connection with other matters which will be placed before it, will convene Monday.

The second charge on which Gregory will appear before the grand jury is the more serious of the two. Prior to the filing of the second charge Gregory was liable to a maximum imprisonment of twenty years.

BOYS AHEAD OF GIRLS IN BIRTH RECORD

Forty-five births were reported to the Board of Health during the past week and during the same period there were twenty-five deaths. Of the births twenty-six were males and nineteen were females. Of the deaths there were eleven males and fourteen females. Five bodies were shipped to the city for burial. There were reported during the week seventeen cases of contagious and infectious diseases, consisting of four cases of scarlet fever, one of diphtheria, one of measles, and one of typhoid fever. One house was quarantined on account of smallpox, thirty-four on account of scarlet fever, and six on account of diphtheria.

MCCORMICK OFFERS A SECOND REWARD

Supplemental Sum of \$5000 Will Be Paid for Substantial Information.

UTAH BANK PRESIDENT EXPLAINS CONDITIONS

\$15,000 Now Outstanding for Arrest and Conviction of Robbers.

Those who have in charge the interests of President W. S. McCormick, of the Utah National bank, have reported to Mr. McCormick that there is considerable criticism of the language used in offering a reward for the conviction of the persons who had to do with the bank robbery. It is urged, from the very nature of the case, that although conclusive proof of the guilt of the bank thieves may be presented, the power of the friends of the offenders would operate to prevent conviction. The reward stipulates that there must be a conviction.

The appended proposal is given out by Mr. McCormick, it is explained, for the purpose of encouraging the public to assist in uncovering the crime. The language of this proposal is intended to convey the fact that, in addition to the \$10,000 reward offered by the bank, President McCormick will pay liberally for information that may assist in bringing the guilty ones to an accounting, or the return of all or a part of the stolen funds.

Mr. McCormick's Offer. In making this supplemental offer Mr. McCormick declares that he is ready to pay for substantial information and is willing for others to say whether or not the information presented is substantial, direct or of value in detecting the guilty or in locating the money.

Following is Mr. McCormick's offer: To the Public. I am offering a reward of a sum not exceeding five thousand (\$5000) dollars for any information (communicated in writing) of practical and substantial value in detecting the person or persons who took or misappropriated \$108,250 of the funds of the Utah National bank, or any other matter, or any difference which would result in the recovery of the money or any part thereof, it being understood that I do not hereby make myself liable to the aggregate for an amount exceeding said sum, nor is this offer made to any member of the Utah National bank, or any salaried bank officer, or
