

TEXT OF NORTH SEA TREATY MADE PUBLIC

aim Is to Preserve Status Quo of Relations Between the Countries Involved.

BERLIN, April 24.—The North Sea treaty signed here yesterday was made public today. It takes the form of a joint declaration, as follows:

"The governments of Germany, Denmark, France, Great Britain and the Netherlands and Sweden, influenced by the wish to strengthen the bonds of neighborly friendship between their states and the treaty contributory toward universal peace, concur in the policy as to the lands bordering on the North sea, aiming at preserving the existing territorial status quo.

"They declare, therefore, that they are firmly resolved to maintain and mutually respect the existing territorial rights of their states in these regions. "If any circumstances whatever should arise which in the opinion of one of the above mentioned governments should threaten the existing territorial status quo, the signatories of this declaration will confer with each other in order to arrive at an understanding, through agreement among themselves, upon such measures as they may regard as useful in the interest of preserving the present status quo of their possessions. The present declaration will be ratified as soon as possible and the ratifications will be handed into Berlin as soon as possible, but not later than December 31."

TORNADO KILLS FOUR AND INJURES HUNDRED

ALEXANDRIA, La., April 24.—A tornado which struck Richland, La., sixteen miles south of here, today, killed four people, fatally injured two and destroyed thousands of dollars worth of property. About a hundred more people were more or less seriously injured. Ephraim Pezard and his wife and baby were killed when their house was blown down upon them, and a negro child was killed. Two negroes were fatally injured.

PRINCE HELIE LOVINGLY GREETED MME. ANNA GOULD

NAPLES, April 24.—Mme. Anna Gould arrived here today from New York on board the steamer Friedrich der Grosse and was met in the harbor by Prince Helie de Sagan, who arrived in England a few days ago and hurried hither to welcome Mme. Gould. The steamer came into the harbor at 6 o'clock this morning and the prince was one of the first to go on board. He rushed to Mme. Gould's cabin, met her at the door, lifted his hat and kissed her hand. The prince refused to be interviewed or make any statement. The tutor of Mme. Gould's children, however, in a brief interview said:

"Rest assured that the marriage will occur, but nobody can say when or where. My conviction rests on what I have seen and heard from Mme. Gould. I am sure it is a true love match."

Mme. Gould was smiling and contented. After the prince had kissed her hand she took him into the salon reserved for ladies, where they conversed for half an hour.

BONVICIN RESISTS DEPUTY SHERIFFS

Finally He Is Taken Before a Commission and Declared Insane.

Vignio Bonvicin, the Austrian, with whom Night Jailor Earl Ripley, at the city jail, engaged in a scuffle to keep him from leaving the jail, Thursday evening, was adjudged insane by Judge Armstrong in the third district court Friday afternoon and ordered committed to the State Mental hospital at Provo.

In connection with the commitment of the mental hospital, was appointed trustee to care for \$600, which Bonvicin possesses and which he left at a Commercial street saloon last Wednesday night. Deputy Sheriff Sharp and Sperry attempted to care for the money, but Bonvicin getting him before the insanity commission. In the corridors of the county jail the demented man held back and had to be dragged from the place. On the street he resisted and a back finally had to be called to carry him to the courtroom. Deputy Sharp severely injured his thumb in the scuffle.

SUSPECTED BANDITS ARE ONLY MERE BOYS This May Account for Failure to Carry Out Bold and Desperate Plan.

BUTTE, Mont., April 24.—Two youths, each carrying a revolver and a rifle, boarded a northbound Great Northern train at Northville at 10:30 o'clock this morning, just as deputy sheriff's from Butte were about to arrest them. They were arrested at Basin, a few miles further north. They refused to talk. Trails led from the scene of the attempted hold-up of the North Coast Limited last night, a few miles east of Butte, to Northville, and while the men held in Basin may not be the bandits, their actions were considered suspicious. The two men arrested last night near the scene of the attempt refuse to give further details of the occurrence, over which considerable mystery still hangs.

The Sheriff is inclined to believe now that if not railway employees the robbers were well acquainted in the vicinity and had inside information on the movements of trains. The suspects held at Basin gave Sheriff Henderson their names later in the afternoon. They are George Long and Fred Anderson and give their home as Meaderville, a suburb of Butte. They claim to have been en route to the Basin smelter to ask for work. They could give no satisfactory explanation of their heavy armament.

The suspects are boys, 19 and 16 years of age, respectively.

PORTO RICANS RESENT ATTITUDE OF PRESIDENT

SAN JUAN, P. R., April 24.—The intervention of President Roosevelt in the Porto Rican church case is regarded as quite inexcusable in San Juan. The Legislature has authorized an appeal of the case and its dismissal or settlement would require another legislative act. It is thought here that President Roosevelt may influence Governor Post to call an extraordinary session of the Legislature for the purpose of recommending the passage of such an act. The case involves the right of the Roman Catholic church to control the estates formerly owned by the Dominican and Franciscan orders in Porto Rico. The property embraces several convents and rural homes and is valued at about \$1,000,000. A dispatch from San Juan yesterday said that President Roosevelt had instructed Governor Post to bring to Washington all the documents relating to this case. The insular courts have decided points in favor of both parties and an appeal has been taken to the Supreme court of the United States.
