OGDEN HIGH SCHOOL WINS TRACK MEET

Four State Records Are Broken on Cummings Field by Athletes.

HOLMSTED BROTHERS ARE STAR PERFORMERS

Salt Lake High School Makes a Poor Showing; Granite Wins Honors.

The State High school track meet held on Cummings field Saturday afternoon brought forth many surprises. Athletic fans in general looked for a keen competition between the Ogden and Salt Lake teams but the latter was entirely out of the race.

Four Records Broken.

Four State records were broken at the meet. The 100-yard dash was won by E. Jensen of Granite in 1:15.4, breaking the record of 1:16.4 set by the late Harry Williams.

During the pole vault Hancock of the Weber academy escaped serious injury by only a very slight margin. The vaulting pole snapped near the center as he was about to go over the bar.

Lehi runners made a pretty race out of the relay, winning this event from the Ogden team by a margin of 1/10 of a second.

There was a small crowd present considering the importance of the meet. The Ogden team was the only one to have a runner in the 100-yard dash.
