NEW YORK OPERA SINGER IS VICTIM OF SAVAGE BULL DOG NEW YORK, August 3.—Miss Emilie Gardner, prima donna of the Aborn opera last year, was in the hospital at Coney Island today suffering from wounds inflicted by an angry bulldog. Miss Gardner's injuries and the shock she suffered are serious, and her condition today was regarded as critical. The bulldog belongs to Miss Gardner's housekeeper, who left the Gardner cot- tage last night, placing the dog and a litter of puppies in the pantry. Miss Gardner entered the pantry, when the bulldog sprang upon her, fastening her teeth in her left arm. The singer en- deavored to fight off the dog, but the animal tore at her arm, lacerating it ter- ribly, snapped at her right hand, nearly biting off two fingers, and bit her severely about the legs.
