MOST BRUTAL HAZING AT NAVAL STATION

Apprentice Hanged by the Neck Until Loss of Eyesight May Be Result.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 26.—The Bulletin today prints a story of the hazing at the naval training station at Yerba Buena island, of Earl Irey, 21-year-old apprentice on the training ship Pensacola, which will probably result in the loss of sight by Irey and the courtmartial of O. F. Guy and J. Valderius, two shipmates.

According to the story, Irey was caught by Guy and Valderius as he was preparing to retire for the night, a noose fastened tightly around his neck, the rope fastened over a hook and he swung clear of the deck, remaining suspended for five minutes.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 26.—P. B. Easley, superintendent of the Rock Island railroad, today issued a bulletin stating that smoking in the city of Little Rock will not be permitted and that violators of the order will be discharged.

AMSTERDAM, N. Y., Aug. 26.—Fire at Hurricane Farm, owned by Gen. Stephen Sanford, two miles east of this city, which threatened to destroy stables in which a large number of horses were quartered, was extinguished with small loss.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—The State Department today received a telegram from David E. Thompson, Ambassador to Mexico, who was injured by being knocked down by a bicyclist in the city of Mexico yesterday, that he was doing well and suffering only from a badly broken and dislocated arm.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—R. H. Thomas, president of the New York stock exchange, today appointed a committee of five members of the exchange to investigate the heavy sales of stock on Saturday, August 22, which were reported in the newspapers.

MARE ISLAND NAVY YARD, Cal., Aug. 26.—A party of government engineers and telegraph experts left the navy yard today for Alaska, where they will establish a new wireless station near Valdez. Sixty days will be required to complete the work there, which will be the first of a chain of stations at intervals of about 200 miles along the coast from Point Lema, near San Diego, to Alaska.

CHANCE FOR HOMES AT ROSEBUD OPENING

Some Fine Land in South Dakota to Be Opened to Settler in October.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—The Rosebud Indian reservation lands, which under the proclamation of the President are to be disposed of by lottery on October 19, are located on the south side of the state of South Dakota and adjoining the lands in Gregory county which were opened in 1904.

From present indications the approaching opening will be even larger than the Gregory registration, since a much larger tract is to be opened. The plan adopted for this registration and drawing is similar to that used in the Gregory opening, but certain objectionable features which imposed hardships on applicants have been eliminated.

Soldiers Favored. Soldiers who served for three months during the Civil war or the Spanish-American war or the Philippine insurrection will not be required to visit the towns mentioned, but may register through an agent.

There are no settlements on any of these lands, and several townships will be located in suitable places and reserved from homestead entry before March 1, 1909.

E. H. BECKLER, NOTED ENGINEER, DROPS DEAD
