King Sent Greeting

Gov. Hughes of New York, from Catskill, N. Y., telegraphed:

"My heartiest congratulations and most cordial regards."

Archbishop Ireland, from St. Paul, said:

"I beg leave to offer you my most sincere wishes that many, many more anniversaries be allowed you in service of your country and of humanity."

From England Whitehall, Reid, American Ambassador to Great Britain, sent:

"Congratulations on finishing the first half century with a great record. The past, at least, is secure."

Similar messages were received from many persons.

BULGARIA WILLING TO COMPENSATE TURKEY

SOFIA, Oct. 27.—The Bulgarian government today informed the representatives of the foreign powers here of its acceptance of the principle of paying compensation to Turkey, which has been the burden of persistent diplomatic representations during the past fortnight on its part of all the great powers...

As a further step in the direction of peace 50,000 reservists will be discharged tomorrow, leaving the army at its normal strength of 60,000.

The government within a day or two will send a plenipotentiary to Constantinople to negotiate a treaty with Turkey. It is believed that through these steps Bulgaria has done its utmost to clear the situation and conciliate opinion abroad.

KERN MAKES BOLD, SERIOUS CHARGES

Says Trusts and Combines Have Sent \$100,000 Into Indiana for Republicans.

URGES PUBLICITY OF CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS

Man Accused of Handling Cash Enters Emphatic and Unqualified Denial.

TIPTON, Ind., Oct. 27.—"I am reliably informed and make this specific charge that \$100,000 of money, largely contributed by trusts and combines, was brought into Indiana last Sunday and passed through the hands of Hon. Fred Sims, secretary of state."

John W. Kern, the Democratic vice presidential nominee, made the above declaration before a good-sized audience here today.

"I think that every thoughtful and patriotic citizen will see the necessity for the publication of campaign funds before election day," said Mr. Kern. "The people would be much better advised as to how they should vote if they knew the extent to which the great unlawful monopolies and combines were contributing money for campaign purposes and if they also knew which party was the recipient of these contributions."

Inference Drawn

"Every sensible man knows that when a contribution is made to a campaign fund by one of these lawless and plundering combinations it expects to have its name received in the form of special favors."

Mr. Kern reviewed the action of the respective conventions of the parties with reference to publicity of campaign contributions, and continued:

"I do not wonder that the Republican party this year is declining to give the names of the men and corporations that are supplying its means of war. If the people of Indiana knew the names of these donors, Bryan would carry the state by 100,000. Such publication would disclose the fact that every unlawful combination in America has poured out money unlawfully absorbed from the people's earnings into the Republican treasury for the purpose of debauching the ballot."

Reverting to the alleged \$100,000 contribution recently brought into this state, Mr. Kern continued:

Rebuke for His Friend

"Mr. Sims is a most estimable gentleman and a warm personal friend of mine, but I am compelled to say that it is a sad spectacle to see a public official who is required to pass every year upon the question as to what amount of taxes shall be levied upon the railroads and other corporations of his state, handling the money that these corporations are called upon to contribute to the campaign fund. The assessing or taxing officer, who, like Mr. Upham of Chicago or Mr. Sims of Indiana has the power to raise or lower the taxes of corporations, has rare facilities for trying fat out of the corporations whose properties they are required to value."

"I hope the time may come when no public officer will be allowed to neglect his official duties and engage in such questionable business. The time is not far distant when an aroused public sentiment will so purify the political atmosphere as to make the further perpetuation of such wrongs impossible."
