**STRIKE ON THE DENVER & RIO GRANDE**  
 National Story in Church Organ Is Denied in All Quarters.  
 Attributed that occupied nearly a year on the railroad writer for the News tells of a prospective strike by the Denver & Rio Grande of the engineers, brakemen and conductors, and gives the date of said strike as the 22nd of the present month.
