New Incorporations

With the filing with the county clerk, Monday, articles of incorporation of the Shannon-Exsex company a new mercantile establishment was launched. The incorporators are Thomas B. and Mary J. Shannon, J. W. and Lillian J. Essex and J. W. Wharton, all of Salt Lake City, headquarters of the new concern. The capital stock is \$25,000, divided into 250 shares valued at \$100 each, of which 150 shares are set apart as treasury stock. Thomas B. Shannon is president and J. W. Essex, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. These, with the other incorporators, make up the directors.

The Gold Springs Social club of Gold Springs, Iron county, incorporated with the secretary of state to establish and maintain a club and reading room at Gold Springs. George Moody is president; J. L. Wade, secretary, and these, with George E. Hartgrove and Alvor Thompson, form the board of trustees.

The Enterprise Printing and Publishing company incorporated with a capital stock of \$5000, divided into as many shares of \$1 each, to engage in a general printing and publishing business, with headquarters at Virgin, Washington county. The officers are Gus Cowen, Sylvester Earl, H. F. Sutton, James Jenson and O. W. Little of Virgin, and Charles Wilkinson and H. H. Minor of Wheeler.

Articles of incorporation of the Mineral Range Gold Mining company, with headquarters in Salt Lake City, were filed with the county clerk. The capital stock is \$100,000, divided into 400,000 shares of 25 cents each, which is paid by the taking over of five Boston mining claims situated in the Star mining district, Beaver county. The officers are: R. W. McEuen, president; Samuel G. Dye, vice-president; James L. Craig, secretary and treasurer. These, with L. Keithly and M. J. Ruddy, form the board of directors.




