

PHON HAS PLANS LIGHTING STREET
Thoroughfare Will Be Brilliant if Scheme Is Carried Out.
 Street, from Brigham to Fourth distance of four blocks, will be in a position to be made as day any night, if City Engineer C. Kelsey's plans for the lighting of this street are carried out. Kelsey submitted his plans for the street to Mayor Bransford and the mayor gave his hearty consent. Mr. Kelsey will hold a conference with officials of the Utah Railway company this morning to determine whether the plan shall be carried out.
 Kelsey's plan is to place four arc lamps upon each corner of the four intersections from and Fourth South street and on such lamps in each of the blocks. This would give sixteen arc lamps on each side of the street, forty in all.
 The lamps are to be attached to the poles by a bracket. There will be no other obstructions in the way and they will make the street as day, besides adding to the attractiveness of the city. The cost will not be increased material. The street railway company will furnish the luminous lamps and a month each for them, and the price probably would prevail during the winter months. These fifty-six arc lamps are to be placed on the street as light as day. The best-lighted street in any city in the world, Mr. Kelsey says. There is a strong movement to compete this plan for the Army encampment here next fall.
