

New Holmes Building on Second South and State Streets



On the northeast corner of Second South and State street is to be erected a building that will cost \$125,000. Contracts for the construction were signed on Tuesday. G. S. Holmes is the man who will furnish the capital to erect the building. The frontage will be fifty feet, the depth will be 165 feet. In the rear will be two wings, 50 by 66 feet each. The upper portion of the building will contain 190 rooms, while the first floor will contain two store rooms and a garage.
