GOVERNOR HUGHES AFTER FIGHT CLUBS

Will Endeavor to Stop Boxing in New York State if Possible.

WOULD MAKE SPARRING IN PUBLIC A CRIME

All Sorts of Foolish Suggestions for Revising Present Legislation.

NEW YORK, April 6.—New York's many "fight clubs" which have for some time past conducted bouts up to the name practically unregulated under the name of athletic clubs, to which members only are admitted to "boxing exhibitions," are to have a clash with Governor Hughes.

Crime to Spar.

But," he added, "if they want to spar they can do so in a public place if the legislature wants to leave sparring open as a manly exercise and will prevent public exhibitions, let me enact a law to prohibit sparring with more than twenty-five persons where a fee is charged. Such a law would not prevent boxing in a gymnasium, but it would knock these bouts which are evading the law."
