

WILLIE WHITLA NOW DELUGED WITH MAIL

Author of Boy Who Was Kidnapped Receives Begging, Threatening Letters.

SEARON, Pa., April 9.—Mrs. James Boyle, one of the alleged abductors of Willie Whitla, will be brought from Mercer county jail to this city for hearing early next week. This will permit the return of Mrs. Boyle to Mercer in time for the meeting of the grand jury there on April 19. The little Willie Whitla was kidnapped on March 18, more than 4000 pieces of mail have been received addressed to the boy and his father. Mr. Boyle granted the Associated Press exclusive rights to examine the mail today. The correspondence was predominated by 2000 cards from boys in all parts of the United States, Canada, Mexico, and quite a number from Europe. All the writers express their sympathy for Willie and request that he be returned safe and sound to his parents. Letters to Mr. Boyle request donations of money for various purposes, including a western city, desirous of securing a divorce, asks for the necessary money to start proceedings against her husband. A number of the letters are of threatening nature, demanding anything from \$1000 to \$10,000, stating that in the event the money is refused Willie and his family will be blown up by dynamite.

MINISTER RESIGNS, BUT DENIES CHARGE MADE

WASHINGTON, Ind., April 9.—Rev. E. Davidson, president of the First Christian church of this city, who is charged with having contracted a common-law marriage with Miss Laura Dunn Clark, daughter of a former mayor of this city, last December, has resigned his office. Mr. Davidson denies he contracted into any sort of marriage with Miss Clark. Mrs. Clark has published letters requesting while she was at the Grand Hotel, Cincinnati, addressed to Mrs. E. Davidson, in which she is addressed as the wife of the writer. These letters, it is alleged, are in the handwriting of E. Davidson.

BRIDGE BUILDER OF CALIFORNIA IS DEAD

MISSOULA, Mont., April 9.—Alfred Burrell, president of the Burrell Construction and Construction company of Oakland, Cal., died at St. Patrick's hospital in this city at 4:15 a. m. today. Mr. Burrell had been at the infirmary for the last several days, suffering from pneumonia, and had been under the constant care of several physicians, but advanced age, 65 years, told against him.

Mr. Burrell was a resident of Oakland and was in this city to look after a contract which is in the hands of the firm.



SAKAMOTO HAS PRAISE FOR AMERICAN NAVY

NEW YORK, April 9.—Admiral Sakamoto of the Japanese navy, on his way back to Japan after attending the recent maritime conference in England, arrived today from Liverpool. He expressed gratification at the steps taken by the conference to define contraband of war accurately. The admiral added that the relations between Japan and the United States were of the friendliest nature, this friendliness having been demonstrated, he said, by many recent occurrences. Admiral Sakamoto said America had made splendid progress in warship construction since he was in the country ten years ago, and that the nations realized the advance and achievements of the United States navy.

"When I visited this country before, you were the fourth naval power and now you are the second," he said. The admiral declared the American fleet made a fine showing in Japan and that Admiral Sperry was much appreciated by the Japanese. Admiral Sakamoto expressed the belief that the great naval battles of the future would be decided by vessels of the Dreadnaught type, the limit to which he placed at about 25,000 tons.

ARRANGE FOR FUNERAL OF HELENA MODJESKA

LOS ANGELES, April 9.—Most of the details of the arrangements for the funeral of Mrs. Helena Modjeska were completed today. The body will be taken, on Saturday afternoon, to the Knights of Columbus home, Helms, and the funeral will be held at 2:30 and the funeral oration pronounced by Bishop Thomas J. Conroy of the Roman Catholic church. The body will then be removed to the vault and chapel of Calvary cemetery, where it will remain until arrangements can be completed for taking it to Poland for burial. Count Rozetta, Mrs. Modjeska's husband, will raise his future home in Poland. Ralph Modjeska and his family will also accompany the body of his mother to the City of Mexico, which is the condition existing in Poland at the present which would prevent the removal and burial there of the remains of Mrs. Modjeska.

HELENA, April 9.—Mrs. Anna Nelson, widow of the late Andrew Nelson, for whose whereabouts a reward has been offered, passed through this city en route to Tacoma, where she says she will claim his estate value at \$25,000. She says she could not agree with her husband and that this led to their separation in New York upon their return from Europe.
