HEAVY COLLISION IN OGDEN CANYON

Street Cars Crash Together and Number of People Are Injured.

SEVERAL SALT LAKERS SEVERELY SHAKEN UP

Broken Bones Are Thought to Be Most Serious Hurts Suffered.

Special to The Tribune. OGDEN, Aug. 18.—Motorman W. D. Deloney was severely injured and several passengers shaken up, and more or less seriously injured, as the result of a head-on collision between two cars of the Ogden Rapid Transit company, which came together on a curve near the Lewis resort in Ogden canyon this afternoon shortly before 4 o'clock.

Superintendent J. W. Bailey of the Rapid Transit company was acting as motorman on the car bound for the Hermitage resort, which was crowded with members of the Thistle club of Salt Lake on their way to the resort to spend their annual outing. Mr. Bailey was in charge of two other cars which had met the visitors at the Union depot to carry them to the Hermitage. The three cars were run one behind the other, until the month of the canyon was reached when something went wrong with the power. One of the cars was sent ahead, with instructions to Motorman Deloney, who was shaking the city to go onto a side-track until the three cars had passed him.

Deloney, it is said, evidently misunderstood his instructions and proceeded toward the city at a high rate of speed. Before approaching the curve Superintendent Bailey sounded the whistle of his car several times, but Motorman Deloney, evidently did not hear the whistle, and a collision was inevitable, a small-sized panic was created among the passengers, who were hurled about in an attempt to get out of the car. The impact of the two cars was heard for some distance. Mr. Deloney was thrown from his car, receiving a number of bruises and wounds on his body and head. Passengers in both cars were shaken. The vestibules of both cars were crushed together like egg-shells.

Neither of the cars left the track, but the rear trucks of the car in charge of Superintendent Bailey were torn loose, causing the car to run backward for some distance. Deloney was brought to the city where his injuries were attended by Dr. Edwards, at a hospital, which he walked to his home unassisted.
