

WIFE HAS ANOTHER DAY WITH BANKRUPTS

Wife Discharged From Their Obligations in the Federal Court Friday.

Judge John A. Marshall had another wife with the bankrupts in the Federal court Friday. Twelve bankrupts were discharged, one dismissed and one adjudged a bankrupt.

Following is a list of the cases: James Hutcheson of Robinson, Juab county, was dismissed as a bankrupt on petition of the petitioners, Star Tailor company of Chicago.

Robert P. Raine, carpenter, Salt Lake city, was adjudged a bankrupt. Raine has assets of \$888.60 and his liabilities amount to \$121.

Harry Hamlin, painter, Salt Lake City; Peter A. Sneedon, carpenter, Salt Lake City; Henry Walsh, retail grocer, Salt Lake City.

POLICE COURT CASES

Mike O'Grady, John Lunt, Charles Jones, A. Hulce and Charles Wallace are the men who pleaded guilty to the charge of being drunk in Judge Bowman's court Friday morning, and all had sufficient reasons to give his honor for their fall from grace. They were discharged.

J. J. Holmes, Fred Lee, John Carney and Fred Johnson, told the court that they were guilty of trespass and were allowed to continue on their journey to the Pacific coast.

E. Glaser, a special policeman in the employ of the Saltair Beach company, was found not guilty to the charge of having preferred against him by Tom Hurst, a Greek. Each side told such conflicting stories that Judge Bowman dismissed the case with the admonition to Glaser that if he appeared in court again charged with the same offense it would go hard with him.
