PASSER OF BOGUS MONEY SAYS HE WAS HYPNOTIZED BY FATHER

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 19.—Although he protested that he was under a hypnotic spell caused by his father as a hypnotist and while in this state, acting upon suggestion, he passed counterfeit gold pieces heavily on an almost perfect imitation stamp of Uncle Sam's seal, and accompanying this declaration with a strange tale, Henry Lee, 32 years of age, convicted during the Moscow term of court on the charge of counterfeiting, will be hurried to the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kansas, by the United States marshal or his deputies within a few days, there to serve eighteen long months of hard labor, while his wife and four children strive to keep the wolf hunger from the door in their lonely home in northern Idaho.

Lee claimed in the story of his life that he had been raised as a youth without the care of a mother and that there was no woman whom he could call by that name. Early in boyhood he experienced a great fear of his father and almost held him in terror so great was the power the elder Lee had over the son.

Became Hypnotic Subject. For many years he had been under the direct influence of his father, who he claims hypnotized him and forced him to do things that he could not have done if in his normal condition.
