

### CORPORATION OF CULLEN HOTEL CO.

#### John Condon Assumes Full Control Today as President and Treasurer.

In accordance with the announcement exclusively made in The Tribune a few days ago, the Cullen Hotel company has been formed and the articles of incorporation were filed with the county clerk Tuesday. The capital stock given at \$50,000, and this is divided into shares of the value of \$1 each. Of this, 20,000 shares are set aside for treasury, while of the remaining 30,000 shares, John Condon, owner of the hotel, retains 29,996.

The officers of the new company are: John Condon, president and treasurer; John Condon, vice-president; and Frank J. Gustin, secretary. These also form the board of directors. George Thompson and George E. Hancock are additional stockholders. Each of these holds one share, while Mrs. Condon and Mr. Gustin hold a like amount.

All the furniture in the Cullen hotel, the Cullen Hotel annex and the Cullen fixtures, with the lease on the Cullen hotel property, dated October 1, 1907, and running for ten years, is taken over for \$50,000.

By this incorporation, Mr. Condon assumes active control of the entire property, his sole ownership dating from 1904, when new books will be opened, is now planned by Mr. Condon to thoroughly renovate the entire house, and new furniture where needed and make several changes of an important character. These changes, it is understood, will cost no less than \$10,000, and when completed, the house will become one of the best between Denver and San Francisco.

The office staff of the Cullen will be composed of the following: George W. Thompson, manager; William B. Broadbent, head day clerk; R. E. Lee, son clerk; Joseph F. Mottie, night clerk; Graver Gauffield, manager of the cafe; George B. Hancock, in charge of the private office.




