PUBLICITY CAUSES NATIONALS TO ACT

Adopt Playing Schedule of 154 Games, After Five Days' Debate.

BARNEY DREYFUS COMES TO CLUB OWNERS' RESCUE

Newspaper Criticisms Force the League to Take Up Murray's Contract Troubles.

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—The National league tonight adopted a playing schedule calling for 154 games for the coming season, but it was accomplished only after a majority of the magnates had expressed their opinion that newspaper criticism over the delay was causing unfavorable publicity.

Through the wishes of the American league for a 154-game schedule were met, that league's interests were disregarded when it was resolved to stretch the schedule out to October 15.

The American league schedule terminates October 9, although all league contracts with players call for service until October 15.

Barney Dreyfuss of Pittsburgh was the only club owner willing to make concessions, and he saved the league from what seemed to be a hopeless deadlock.

Pittsburgh was scheduled for six Sunday games in Cincinnati, where there is no opposition, and where such dates have been exceptionally remunerative.

St. Louis was scheduled for six Sunday games in Chicago, and four of these were when the champion Detroit of the American league were to play Chicago.

St. Louis and Chicago objected, holding that Detroit would draw the big crowds. The matter was settled today by changing St. Louis to Cincinnati and Pittsburgh to Chicago, so that in Chicago it will be seen whether Pittsburgh or Detroit is the more popular.
