City Council again to wrestle with vexing franchise matter.

SOME WANT PERCENTAGE OF EARNINGS FOR CITY

Location of asphalt plant and gravel pit question also scheduled.

The Saltair franchise will be the principal subject of discussion at the meeting of the city council Monday night.

There is no question that the matter will bring forth a great deal of argument, as several members of the council have expressed their intention of opposing the franchise unless some provision is made therein for the payment to the city for a certain percentage of the gross income received by the company.

Others have expressed themselves as not being in favor of the route contained in the franchise and there will probably be an amendment of the council in its favor of having the cars operated by the present station on Second and Third West streets and thence east on Second.

BLAMES PRESIDENT FOR PRESENT CONDITION

Claims Present Head of Government Will Be Removed at Next Election.

L. Gutierrez de Lara, a Mexican political refugee, lectured at Sunday at the crowded Unity hall on the subject of "Barbarous Mexico."

De Lara gained distinction as a writer who piloted John K. Tarsan, an American magazine, through the intricacies of the Mexican government in obtaining information of which a series of articles in the magazine subsequently appeared.

De Lara was arrested in Los Angeles at the request of the Mexican government and was held in a cell for a long time.

De Lara is now making his way to Washington to go to the inauguration of the new president in Mexico.
