
THE MIDAS COMPANY

WEATHER FORECAST FOR THURSDAY



March, 1910, has been a remarkable month from the standpoint of weather devotees. There has been but a trace of precipitation since the advent of spring and there has been sunshine in abundance. Ordinarily, according to weather statistics, there should be about 10 inches of snow during March, but St. Patrick's day has rolled around and as yet there has been no snow. Salt Lake has had practically continuous sunshine for the last sixteen days. This record has been eclipsed but once. This was in 1883, when Salt Lake had twenty-three days of sunshine without a break.
The temperature thus far this month has been about 10 degrees above normal. The highest point the mercury has touched this month was 65 degrees, which was on the 4th and 14th of March. The lowest temperature was 33 degrees, on March 11.
The warmest it has ever been in Salt Lake since the local weather office was established in 1874 was on March 20, 1879, when the thermometer read 77 de-

GIVEN HIGH COMPLIMENT



The first two weeks of March have been a record-breaker in the matter of plumbing permits issued, as the books of Mr. Farrell's office show that during the first fifteen days of March there were 123 permits. During the same period in 1909 there were sixty-two plumbing permits issued. In 1908 there were thirty-two, and in 1907 there were only fourteen.


