

### CONGRESS SESSION TO BE PROLONGED

#### Little Hope Now for Completion of Work Before the Middle of June.

By Leased Wire to The Tribune. WASHINGTON, March 19.—Members of congress who planned to leave Washington in May now fear that the present session will extend over to June. Developments in the legislative programme have become so complicated that an early adjournment of congress is not looked upon as probable.

This will likely cause a change in the programme of President Taft. He had planned to leave Washington in May on his northwestern and Alaskan trip and to arrive in Beverly, Mass., late in June. National legislators who desired to get back into their districts to begin an early campaign for the next fall election, are disappointed at the outlook. Especially in the house the anxiety to clean up the calendar with a whoop and a hurrah is daily expressed.

It would not be surprising if the present session lasted until the middle of June. While the Republicans are clamoring for an early adjournment, they are largely responsible for the lengthening of the programme. Their tendency to overhaul the railroad bill took affairs back somewhat. The house committee is not through its consideration of the bill, and Chairman Mann says that the committee desires to know everything that is in the measure before it is reported.

Senator Elkins predicted today that the senate would take a month for its consideration of the bill. The conservation bills have hardly been touched. Up to the present time the appropriation bills have absorbed the largest amount of time. Other delay has been occasioned by the congressional investigation of the Ballinger-Finch investigation.


