WATER PROBLEMS UP IN IDAHO

Jackson Lake Dam Bursts, and Flood Is on Way to Lower Works.

BURLEY, Ida., July 8.—Information was received at the headquarters of the reclamation service at this place today that the temporary dam at the Jackson lake reservoir has given way and that the 200,000 acre feet of water stored in the great basin was rushing through the rent in the structure on its way along the circuitous channel of Snake river. The flood should reach Burley by July 9 or 10, according to calculations made by the government engineers. It is thought the flood water will continue running for three or four days. As much water as can be held in Lake Walcott, which is formed by the Minidoka dam backing the water of Snake river far up stream and over a broad stretch of level country.


