

BOOKMAKERS GIVEN PRISON SENTENCE

Way of the Transgressor in Betting Circles Proves to Be Hard.

NEW YORK, July 9.—The first prison sentences ever inflicted in this city on persons making a handbook on the racing were pronounced in the court of special sessions here yesterday on Patrick Flanagan of Philadelphia and Edward McCarthy of this city. Both were sentenced to five days imprisonment. The complainant, a policeman, testified that the two men took him to a local cafe, where they accepted a bet on a horse running at Belmont Park and made a memorandum of the transaction on the edge of a newspaper.

CAR MEN WILL REFUSE OFFER OF COMPANY

NEW ORLEANS, July 9.—New Orleans street car employees will refuse the offer of the company to increase wages a quarter of a cent an hour for five years and to extend this increase and pay a bonus of a quarter of a cent during the sixth year, provided the Panama exposition is held here during the year. This announcement was made by President Mahon, the car men's national president. He said the offer was a play to put the car men in the position of opposing the exposition. The men are considering sending a strike ultimatum to the company.

ITALIAN IS SLAIN AS RESULT OF FEUD

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, July 9.—A tragedy explainable only on the theory of an old Sicilian feud, was enacted here today. Leonardo Balachia of 863 Gault court, in the heart of the north side Italian district, was slain by a man who suddenly approached while Balachia was talking to a third person in front of the Balachia home. The murderer fired five bullets into his victim's back. Although pursued, he disappeared up an alley after bowling over a grocer who attempted to seize him. Mrs. Balachia, mother of five children, declared her husband had received no threatening letters and ascribed the crime to a feud begun in Sicily, but of which she knew nothing definite.

APPLIES NEW IDEA FOR WASHING MACHINE

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, July 9.—An Australian inventor has applied the principle of the steam coffee percolator to a washing machine, says Vice Consul Henry D. Walker in a report to the bureau of manufactures. The device consists of a copper cone which is placed in the wash boiler. The steam forces the soapy water through the apex in the same way as in the coffee percolator, and the process goes on until the linen is spotless. It is said to save hard work and wear on fine fabrics.

Rain in Colorado.

DENVER, July 9.—A drizzling rain is falling over Colorado today, and a continuance of the conditions is promised for tomorrow, refreshing plains that had been parched by seven weeks of dry weather. The thermometer, which had been close to the nineties at midday for several weeks, stood at 53 at noon today.

By Associated Press. LINCOLN, Neb., July 9.—Attorney General Thorton today advised Governor Shallenberger that the statutes of the state do not prohibit the exhibition of prizes with picturians. He declared that each community would have to take action regarding the matter.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Three dead and seven prostrated in the record for the heat wave which spread over Washington at noon yesterday.

LAPORTE, Ind., July 9.—Physicians reported today that John Shippen, who engaged in a prize fight with Charles Parnell on July 4, would die from the injuries he received. Parnell has disappeared.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—On the ground that there was no direct evidence to sustain the charge that he was an anarchist, Assistant Secretary Campbell of the department of commerce and labor today refused to order the deportation of Anatoly Vasiloff, a Russian held in the Hawaiian Islands. Vasiloff said he was intended to go to Hawaii by misrepresentation.

NEW YORK, July 9.—Declared by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, to be the largest strike in point of members, that has ever taken place in this country, the strike of the garment makers of this city in which 75,000 men and women are claimed to be out today, will end today with no sign of weakening on either side.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Secretary Meyer has undertaken a personal inquiry into the work of enlarging the dry docks under the recent appropriations, which have just become available. He said today that a 110-foot width would be the basis of all future drydocks, to meet the same width in the locks on the Panama canal. The Fremerton, Washington, will be the first to be enlarged today, but its 800 feet of length will not be disturbed.

ALBANY, N. Y., July 9.—Governor Hughes will be the guest of Colonel Roosevelt at Oyster Bay on Tuesday evening next, according to an announcement made today at the executive chamber.

PHILADELPHIA, July 9.—The proposition of certain men who have been prominent in reform movements in Pennsylvania to place a ticket in the field this fall in opposition to both the Republican and Democratic state tickets took definite form today when Henry C. Niles of York, former state chairman of the Lincoln party, announced that an independent state convention will be held in this city on July 27 and 28.

WASHTAU, Wis., July 9.—A heavy rain started in local and indications are that there will be a heavy downpour all day, which will be of great benefit to the farmers and extinguish the forest fires which are raging around this city.

DES MOINES, Ia., July 9.—Rain characterized by Dr. George M. Chappell of the Iowa crop bureau as "an unusual rain" is falling today over northern and western Iowa.

GIRL LOSES HER LIFE TO SAVE YOUNG FRIEND

EVANSTON, Ill., July 9.—Florence Burden, 16 years old, a high school girl, sacrificed her life in Lake Michigan here yesterday to save that of her chum, Ethel Moulton, 15 years old. The girls were bathing. Miss Moulton, who was unable to swim, waded into deep water and was swept from her feet. Miss Burden, a good swimmer, went to her rescue. Miss Moulton was supported by Miss Burden until William Bruder, reached the struggling girls. "Take her, I can swim," Miss Burden reported to her father, said to Bruder. Bruder, weighted down by his clothing and Miss Moulton's weight, barely reached a row boat that put out from shore. Miss Moulton was unconscious, but was now revived.

CAUGHT AFTER CHASE OF FIVE LONG YEARS

PHILADELPHIA, July 9.—Brought to the bar of the United States court in this city today after she had eluded capture for nearly five years, Sophie Beck, one of the principals in the famous Storey cotton swindle, was sentenced to 10 years in the United States, pleaded guilty to the charge of using the mails to defraud. She was reported to have said to her attorney, "I am glad to get out of this and to pay \$200 of the cost of prosecution. The Storey swindle had been exposed five years ago. Sophie Beck went to Europe. She returned to the United States last year and was arrested in Atlantic City in September. All of the principals of the Storey company, with the exception of Stanley Francis, fled the country. Francis recently completed serving a three and one-half years' sentence in the penitentiary. Frank Martin, president of the concern, is serving a fifteen years' sentence in Sing Sing on a charge brought against him in New York, and Edward Storey, another of the promoters of the concern, died in an insane asylum in France.

Cannon, both prominent local bankers, returned from Liverpool yesterday on the Mauretania with pleasant news regarding the feeling abroad concerning America's business future. Dominick said that in Germany and England there was no diminution of confidence in American securities. The foreign bankers, he said, had no fear of ill-effects arising from any interference of the interstate commerce commission with the American railroads. He had been abroad four weeks on a pleasure trip.


