

PUBLIC SCHOOLS ARE OPEN

Enrollment on First Day Eighty Per Cent of Eligible Population.

EXPECTED HIGH SCHOOL RECORD WILL BE BROKEN

Estimated Fifteen Hundred Will Be Enrolled; Figures in Comparison With 1909.

Salt Lake City's public schools opened for the school year of 1910-1911 Monday morning under auspicious circumstances. The opening of the schools was one week earlier than usual, the enrollment was close to 15,000, an excellent record. This is the largest enrollment of the city's total school population.

At the High School. The attendance at the high school the first day, 1188, at which the enrollment always is slow for the reason that pupils ready for the first day of school are in good standing remain out for financial advantage calculating that it will be easier for them to catch up, work in the factory. The maximum enrollment for the high school this year is expected to be close to 1500. The enrollment the opening day last year was 1184 or sixty-two below the attendance the opening day this year.

Comparative Enrollment. There is published herewith a table showing the estimated maximum enrollment, based on the most reliable data obtainable in June, eliminating the possibility of changes in boundaries and not taking into consideration the normal capacity of each building and the enrollment the first day last year and this. The enrollment in 1909 was 1184 and the Sugar House buildings last year are not given for the reason that the former were not used when the Sugar House came into the city with the recent annexation of territory:

This the councilmen did today, leaving the Wilson hotel at 10 o'clock this morning. The matter was laid over at the suggestion of Messrs. Morston, Hall and Wood. The board of public works Tuesday night might be authorized to call for bids.

Only Messrs. Hall, Holley, Lees and Fernstrom voted against the McKinley resolution. Messrs. Ferry, Hodgson and Lyne voted in favor of it.

Heads to Committee. The Ninth South street canal nuisance went to the committee of the whole for consideration Thursday evening, at Mr. McKinley's suggestion.

Beesley Reappointed. J. D. Beesley, inspector and measurer under the new ordinance increasing his salary from \$75 to \$100 a month. The offer of Mrs. Thompson's company, which wants to concentrate its holdings, to exchange eighty-eight acres of land for the property owned by the city and the ground adjoining the company's holdings in the left fork, went to the public grounds and waterways committee.

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
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
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
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
