

MUNICIPAL FIGHT IN SEATTLE HOT

Mayor Reinstates Chief of Police Who Was Removed by Acting Mayor.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 30.—Chief of Police Charles W. Wapenstein, who was removed from office yesterday by Acting Mayor Max Wardall, was reinstated today by Mayor Hiram C. Gill, and immediately took charge of the police force.

Soon after the departure of Mayor Gill on a pleasure cruise to Alaska two weeks ago, Acting Mayor Wardall made an investigation of vice in Seattle. In a sensational statement he charged the chief of police with exporting money from gambling houses and other unlawful resorts.

Wapenstein was removed from the position of chief of detectives of Cincinnati on June 7, 1885. He was removed from a position on the Seattle detective force in 1901, after an investigating committee had reported him "unfit to occupy the position of detective or any other position in the police department."

NAVAL IMPROVEMENTS FOR NORTHWEST COAST


WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—A naval torpedo repair and trial station was ordered today to be located at Keyport, Wash., on the Puget sound near the Bremerton navy yard. This action is provided for in a telegram accepting a tract at that place on which the navy had an option for the last month.

The appropriation available is \$145,000 and the tract involves 195 acres, of which fifty-eight acres have yet to be condemned.
