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
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

Notice is hereby given by the city council of Salt Lake City of the intention of such council to make the following described improvement, to-wit: Constructing concrete sidewalks five (5) feet wide and four (4) inches thick on both sides of Ninth avenue between K and M streets, except 155 feet running east from K street on the south side of said Ninth avenue, in sidewalk district No. 24, and defray the abutters' portion of the cost and expense thereof estimated at one thousand two hundred twenty-six and 50/100 (\$1226.50) dollars, or one and 15/100 (\$1.15) dollars per front or linear foot of abutting property, there being 1115 feet abutting said improvement, by a local assessment upon the lots or pieces of ground within the following described district, being the district to be affected and benefited by said improvement, namely:

All of the south side of lots 1 and 2, block 138; all of the south side of lots 12 and 24, Grand View subdivision, block 139; all of the north side of lot 4, block 115; all of the north side of lots 1 and 12, Grand View subdivision, block 114, plat "D," Salt Lake City survey.

The total cost of said improvement is estimated at one thousand five hundred (\$1500.00) dollars, of which sum the city's portion is two hundred seventy-three and 50/100 (\$273.50) dollars, leaving one thousand two hundred twenty-six and 50/100 (\$1226.50) dollars to be raised by a local assessment.

All protests and objections to the carrying out of such intention must be presented in writing, stating therein lot and block, or description of property, to the city recorder on or before the 26th day of December, 1910, being the time set by said council when it will hear and consider such protests and objections as may be made thereto.
