

GERMAN COUNT SHOTS INDIAN

Tragedy of Far North Took Place in Presence of Nobleman's Wife.

BEREAVED SQUAW WILL BE WITNESS AT THE INQUEST

Slayer of Red Man Says Camp Was Looted While He Was Away Hunting.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Jan. 9.—The body of Nagita, an Indian who was killed in the Sushitna country by Emil Maurer, a big game hunter, said to be a German count, will be brought here tonight by a special deputy United States marshal.

Nagita's squaw and children will accompany the body. An inquest will be held, pending the result of which the warrant charging Maurer with murder has not been served.

Maurer alleged that the Indian robbed his camp and then threatened to kill him.

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 9.—A letter received today from Fairbanks, Alaska, and dated three weeks ago, states that Emil Maurer, said to be a German count, who went into the Mt. McKinley country on a hunting and exploring trip last spring, had shot and killed an Indian named Nagita, and that a grant had been issued for Maurer's arrest.

Maurer, who is a man of means and is said to be well known at the German consulate in Chicago, outfitted in Fairbanks, and accompanied by Mrs. Maurer, started on the Sushitna river country. He intended to kill game and, if possible, climb Mt. McKinley.

After penetrating far into the wilderness his supplies gave out and he and his wife were reduced to the extremity of killing and eating the dogs.

While Maurer was absent hunting Mrs. Maurer gave birth to a son. On his trip Maurer killed a moose. He hastened back to camp with some of the meat, and as soon as Mrs. Maurer and the baby were able to travel the family started on to the neighbor hood of the moose, leaving their outfit at the old camp.

On returning to the old camp they found it looted of all valuables, including \$1200 in money.

Soon after their return the Indian Nagita, his squaw and children arrived, presumably to get the rest of the camp outfit. An altercation between the two men resulted in the German shooting the Indian dead.

This news was brought to Fairbanks by two men from the Sushitna country.

INDICTED MAN REPORTED DEAD SAID TO BE ALIVE

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 9.—It was declared today in the district court that Ollie J. Watkins, a real estate dealer, indicted for having used the mails to defraud in a grant to build a runway accident near San Bernardino two years ago, was alive and in the hands of the federal authorities had received word that Watkins had been seen in Australia and that secret service agents were close on his trail.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—An effort to obtain congressional permission for the admission of two Chinese students to West Point was checked in the senate today. The resolution was reported by Senator Warren from the committee on military affairs.

DEFENDERS DISCOVER INVADERS PROMPTLY

Rear Admiral Staunton Advises Washington Concerning the Whereabouts of "Enemy."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—The Atlantic battleship fleet was discovered by the "defending fleet" 1180 miles east of St. Augustine, Fla., at 9 o'clock Sunday morning while approaching the shores of the United States as a "technical enemy."

The navy department was advised to this effect in a wireless telegram received today from Rear Admiral Staunton, commanding the defending fleet.

The fleet was sighted in approximately latitude 30 degrees north and longitude 85 degrees west. In messages received from Rear Admiral Staunton the department was advised that the scouting fleet was keeping in touch with the battleship fleet, and that the latter was pursuing a course south by southwest on its way to Guantanamo.

It was the duty of Rear Admiral Staunton to watch the entire Atlantic coast to detect the advancing fleet. In view of the great latitude of his watch, naval officers are jubilant over his achievement, which they declare indicates that an approaching hostile fleet could be located by scout ships before it could get within striking distance of the American shore.
