

SENATE FAILS TO AGREE WITH IOWA MEMBER

Cummins's Amendment to Reciprocity Bill Providing for Free Entry of Meats Voted Down.

SUTHERLAND ACTS WITH INSURGENTS

Other Amendments to Be Voted Upon Monday; Pact Likely to Emerge in Original Form.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The defeat in the senate today of the first of Senator Cummins's amendments to the Canadian reciprocity bill made it clear that the measure is scheduled to emerge from the senate without any change from its original form.

By a vote of 32 to 14, the senate refused to attach to the bill Senator Cummins's proposal to give Canadian fresh meats and meat products free access to the American markets.

The fate of the first of the Cummins amendments is expected to be that of all the others, which are to be voted on Monday, along with amendments by Senator Simmons of North Carolina, somewhat similar in scope.

Other Amendments. The remaining Cummins amendments propose to put Canadian iron and steel products, flour, lumber, leather, woolen and cotton goods on the free list without giving similar advantages to American goods going into Canada.

After some difficulty in securing a quorum, the senate resumed consideration of the Canadian reciprocity bill today and over the protest of Senator Cummins began voting on his proposed amendments.

Senator Burton of Ohio, in voting against Mr. Cummins's amendment, said he did so because he thought it would wreck the whole Canadian agreement.

LABOR BUREAU FINDS LIVING COST IS HIGH

Investigation Shows That Wholesale Prices for 1910 Were 4 Per Cent Higher Than in 1909.

SOME VARIATIONS IN TWELVE MONTHS

Potatoes, Eggs, Coffee and Mess Beef Made Large Advances; Interesting Figures Given.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The high cost of living is no myth. An investigation by the bureau of labor of the prices of 257 commodities during 1910 shows that wholesale prices there were 4 per cent higher than in 1909, and 1.6 per cent above the average of 1907, which was the year of highest prices since 1890.

Then followed a slight decline and from June to December, 1910, prices receded nearly level and at the close of 1910 there were still 39 per cent higher than the ten-year average between 1890 and 1900 and 45.4 per cent higher than the record set by the high price year, 1907.
