U FRESHMEN DEFEAT OGDEN HIGH SCHOOL

Score of 10 to 3 Averages Defeat by Junction City Team Earlier in Season.

M'CARTY IS INJURED

University Star Plays Aggressive Game Until His Shoulder Is Hurt.

University of Utah freshmen defeated the Ogden high school football team in Ogden yesterday by the score of 10 to 3. The game was a great surprise, as the Ogdenites triumphed over the freshmen by the score of 25 to 0 early in the season and it was supposed that they were even stronger now than they were before. From the beginning of the game until the final whistle it was a desperate struggle. Although there were numerous penalties enforced it was an interesting contest.

In the first quarter the freshmen worked the ball down the field to the 10-yard line, where M'Carty, on a quarterback line, dove through the orange and black line for ten yards, making the first score of the day. In the second quarter the freshmen executed a forward pass and got the ball to the Ogden 20-yard line. From here Warthman, the Utah fullback, made a beautiful 29-yard run through a broken field for the second and last score of the contest. After this touchdown M'Carty failed to kick goal. Then Ogden took a brace and tore up the freshmen line until they had the ball on the 23-yard line from where Moran, the clever quarterback, made a goal from placement.

This was the only score that Ogden was able to register during the entire game. In this quarter the freshmen came near scoring again when M'Carty on a fake punt almost got away from the bunch, but he could not get a good start. On the next play M'Carty was hurt in the shoulder and had to be removed from the game. Vandy took his place. In the last quarter the Ogdenites took another brace and for a time were successful at the line, but the freshmen never realized.

Throughout the entire game the freshmen were masters of the situation and at no time were they in danger of defeat. The ball was in Ogden's territory and the Utah youngsters were superior.

YOKEL DOWNS WRESTLER IN EIGHTEEN SECONDS

Salt Lake Athlete Accepts Challenge of Idaho Champion to Throw Him Twice in Ninety Minutes

IDAHO FALLS, Id., Nov. 24.—Mike Schwelzler won from T. Johns in straight falls, the first in twenty-three seconds, the second in three minutes.

Dow Williams, former wrestling partner of Frank Golech, refereed the bouts. Yokel agreed to throw his opponent in the hour. Root made a good showing in the first round.

Frank McCarroll, the local champion and considered the best man in the state, challenged Yokel, who consented to meet him in a handicap, agreeing to throw him twice in ninety minutes. Ray McCarroll and Sifer will go on for a finish at the same time.

Yokel was the first to win in the second round. He got the second fall in eighteen seconds.

The first preliminary, between Sifer and McCarroll, resulted in a draw. The second, between Yokel and McCarroll, resulted in a draw. The third, between Yokel and Sifer, resulted in a win for Yokel in five minutes and fifty seconds.

The stars among the freshmen were Miller and Titus at ends, Warthman at fullback and Goodspeed at half. M'Carty played a force game until injured. Among the Ogdenites who won distinction by their prowess were Moran at quarterback, Smith at center and Stowe at fullback.

This is the last game of the season for the freshmen, but they will practice with the varsity team to keep the latter in trim for the Idaho game Thanksgiving day.

HIGH SCHOOL TEAM IS HARD AT WORK

The high school football team has three more hard practice sessions before the game with Ogden on Thanksgiving. Coach Richardson announced that the team will practice at 10 o'clock today instead of the afternoon, but the men were told to show up for practice next week at 2 o'clock. Yesterday "Galt" was down and the team was put through a hard practice. All the plays were run over and in some were changed slightly. In the Thanksgiving game high school will play mostly the new style of football, and will only resort to the old style which will not work. If any drop kicking has to be done in the Ogden game, Wilson will be called on to do it. High school is lucky in the department of kicking this year, as eight men excel in punting. Four hundred and thirty-six tickets to Ogden have been sold so far. Besides the high school students many former graduates will go.

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Nov. 24.—New canals have appeared on Mars in the Sabaeus Sinus and Mare Acutum. They were seen by the Lowell observatory for the first time on November 21 and were photographed the same evening.

The observations records now extend through a whole cycle and more of Mars oppositions, furnishing proof that these canals in their present condition were not there before.

In appearance the new canals are straight lines like the canals generally and connect at pivotal points with the rest of the system.


