HEALTH OF THE CITY SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

The weekly report of the city board of health shows that the number of contagious and infectious cases was one-fourth less than the corresponding week one year ago. Last week only forty-eight new cases were reported, as compared with 208 for the same week one year ago. The new contagion reported last week was as follows: Seventeen cases of smallpox, one of diphtheria, two of mumps, one of German measles, seven of scarlet fever, six of measles, eight of whooping cough, one of pneumonia and five of chicken pox.

WIRE TAPPING CASE IS SET FOR MARCH 4

The case of De Witt B. Lowe, E. F. May, J. P. McAllister, W. L. Scott and R. L. Perkins, charged with fraudulently reading the contents of a telegraphic message, was set for trial March 4 by Presiding Judge Morse of the Third district court, yesterday. March 2 was set as the date for hearing argument on a demurrer.

Given Year in Prison.

Judge F. C. Loochbrow in the Third district court yesterday sentenced Alfred Peterson to one year's imprisonment in the state penitentiary. Peterson was convicted of burglary in the third degree.

TELLS OF ATTEMPTS TO SECURE CONTROL

Agents of National Packing Company Testify to Buying Stock in Rival Concern.

CHICAGO, Feb. 24.—Three attempts by Edward Tilden, president of the National Packing company, and who is one of the defendant packers on trial before United States District Judge Carpenter, to obtain control of Schwarzschild & Sulzberger company, the principal competitor of the Chicago packers, was described by Frederick Joseph on the witness stand today.

The witness said that he and his son Moses, who formerly were officers of Schwarzschild & Sulzberger company, acted as agents of Tilden in the attempt to obtain a controlling interest in the concern.

The Josephs withdrew from the company before they accomplished their purpose, according to the government, and at present are managing the New York Butchers' Dressed Beef company, a subsidiary of the National Packing company. The first attempt to buy stock was November 25, 1904, when 475 of the 50,000 shares of the company were purchased by the Josephs for \$75,135 and turned over to Tilden, October 24, 1905, an additional 8615 shares were purchased for \$52,525. March 9, 1910, 1573 more shares were acquired for \$192,712 and transferred to Tilden. The government declares this stock was later exchanged for preferred stock in Sulzberger & Sons company, successor to Schwarzschild & Sulzberger company.

Frederick Joseph was on the stand all day and will continue his testimony Monday.

ARMY OFFICERS ARE DETAILED FOR DUTY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Second Lieutenant Leighton W. Haselbaur, Seventeenth infantry, is detailed for duty with the signal corps and will proceed to Augusta for duty.

Major Thomas G. Hanson, infantry, is relieved from duty at the army service schools, Fort Leavenworth, to take effect August 1.

The resignation of First Lieutenant Harry Cohen, Philippine scouts, has been accepted, to take effect February 25.

First Lieutenant Henry Beeuwkes, medical corps, will report to this city not later than March 10, to the army medical school, for temporary duty, and upon the completion of this duty will return to his proper station.

Major James T. Dean, adjutant general, is relieved from duty as assistant to the adjutant general, eastern division, and will proceed to San Francisco and sail about April 5 for the Philippines for duty.

The leave of absence granted First Lieutenant Jarvis J. Bain, corps of engineers, by the chief of engineers, is extended two months.
