

TO MAKE UTAH DAY GENUINE SUCCESS

State's Representation at Los Angeles Land Show Will Be Worthy.

DOUGLAS WHITE TALKS

Believes That State Will Derive Great Benefit From the Exhibit.

That Utah's exhibit surpasses all others entered at the Pacific Land & Products exposition in Los Angeles, and that this state will derive inestimable benefits therefrom, form the substance of reports from Douglas White, industrial agent for the Salt Lake route, who arrived in this city yesterday, and J. Edward Taylor, state horticultural inspector, who is in charge of the display from this state, and who telegraphed the news from the coast city yesterday.

Utah Exhibit Excels. Both Mr. White and Mr. Taylor declare that the Utah exhibit excels all others and is attracting wide attention from visitors. Both men pay high tributes to the position management for special concessions made to Utah.

According to present plans, Utah Day, March 19, will be celebrated under the auspices of the exposition management, which has invited all citizens of Utah now living in California, and also all those who contemplate attending the show, to join in festivities appropriate to the occasion. At 6 o'clock in the evening, a banquet will be given, with Gov. William Spry, Secretary Joseph E. Caine and party, including Utahans, as guests. At 8:30 o'clock there will be given a great reception to representative Utahans.

Leaves Here Sunday.

In discussing the show yesterday, Mr. White said: "I will leave here Sunday with Governor Spry and his party for Los Angeles. The show opened there last Tuesday, and will continue until the 15th of Utah day. The show is the handsomest ever held in America. It was the general opinion here that the exhibit and show at Los Angeles did Utah a great deal of good, and the people there will double the good work this year. The attendance on the show was 100 per cent increase over last year. "The decorations are of a nature that could not be seen in California, and are of the United States. They are of palms, interspersed with cut flowers. The effect is beautiful and seems much more so when one goes there from here, where there is show on the ground. There is a question in the minds of some as to which is the most beautiful, the exhibit at San Bernardino county and Utah. In my opinion there is no comparison, as the exhibit here is the more beautiful."

The Utah exhibit was prepared largely and taken to Los Angeles by the Salt Lake Route for the purpose of advertising the state of Utah. The following telegram was sent to Los Angeles by Mr. White yesterday:

Telegram From Taylor.

The telegram sent to Secretary Caine by Mr. Taylor follows: "Land show is well under way and a great success. Crowds are large and hundreds are interested. Utah's exhibit is conceded to be the best in the hall. There are lots of Utah people here and will attend Utah day program. Give me instructions on detail for Utah day as soon as possible."

Milwaukee Is Busy.

there has been an ominous silence. It is now thought that the Milwaukee & Puget Sound line may abandon its present route through the rough, non-productive Sixteen-Mile country and swing its transcontinental business through the Gallatin valley, Bozeman, Helena, and Manhattan are the towns that will be most benefited by the extension.

The new road will leave Missoula and go east and toward the south bank near Corvallis, then direct to Hamilton, the southern extremity. The road will open up some rich country, according to Mr. Sloan.

SHORT-WEIGHT MEN TO BE PROSECUTED

Willard Hansen, dairy and food commissioner, and his deputies were busy yesterday collecting evidence against grocers and markets in this city, accused of giving short weight in butter. Packages of butter labeled fifteen ounces, and sold as pound quantities, were purchased yesterday and receipts of the sales obtained from the dealers. The names of those found giving short weight will be cited to the state pure food bureau at its meeting March 21, and complaint may be filed against them.

It was said yesterday by one of the deputies that some of the retailers were being given short weight by certain of the packing companies shipping butter into the state. According to the deputy, butter has been shipped to the retailers in thirty pound quantities, but the "pound" packages were found to weigh only fifteen ounces.
