

FITZGERALD MAKES SARCASTIC SPEECH

New York Democrat Quotes Lincoln to Expose Alleged Ambition of Roosevelt.

MEMORANDUM IS READ

How the Ex-President Regarded His Tenure of Office in White House.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The activities of Colonel Roosevelt were denounced in the house today in a speech bristling with sarcasm, delivered by Representative Fitzgerald, Democrat, of New York, chairman of the house appropriations committee.

Mr. Fitzgerald declared Roosevelt the "greatest danger faced by the republic" and quoted at length from a speech by Abraham Lincoln to bear out the charge. As an indication of Roosevelt's attitude toward the presidency, Mr. Fitzgerald produced a memorandum prepared when plans for new executive offices at the White House were under consideration in 1902. Beside a discussion of "temporary" and permanent quarters for the president appeared in the handwriting of Colonel Roosevelt, the words, "to be permanent during my lifetime."

Quotes Lincoln.

The New York member applied directly to Roosevelt extracts from a speech delivered by Abraham Lincoln before the Young Men's Lyceum at Springfield, Ill. In part, the extracts read:

Many great and good men sufficiently qualified for any task they should undertake may ever be found whose ambition would aspire to nothing beyond a seat in congress, a gubernatorial or presidential chair; but such belong not to the family of the lion or the tribe of the eagle. What! Think you these places would satisfy a Caesar, an Alexander or a Napoleon? Never! Towering genius displaces a beaten path. It seeks regions half unexplored. It sees no distinction in adding story to story upon the monuments of fame erected to the memory of others.

possible it will have it, whether at the expense of emancipating slaves or enslaving free men. Is it unreasonable, then, to expect that some man, possessed of the loftiest genius, coupled with ambition sufficient to push it to its utmost stretch, will at some time spring up among us? And when such a one does, it will require the people to be united with each other, attached to the government and the laws, and generally intelligent, to frustrate his designs.

Breeders of Registered Herefords the World Over Can Compete Here.

Special premiums in the cattle competitions to be held at the coming state fair are offered by the American Hereford Cattle Breeders' association, conditions of the contests having been given out yesterday by Secretary Horace S. Ensign. Speaking of the growing altitude of Utah citizens in favor of home products, Mr. Ensign said:

Rules Laid Down.

Exhibitors must file with the secretary of the fair the name and herd book number of each animal entered for these premiums, and the fair association's secretary, in reporting awards to the secretary of the American Hereford Cattle Breeders' association, must give the name and number of each animal, otherwise premiums will not be paid. COMMISSION WILL INVESTIGATE TRAILS

Vexed Question of Where Sheep Shall Travel May Then Be Settled.

CONFER WITH WOOLMEN

Committee of Six to Be Divided Between Sheepmen and City Officials.

A joint committee, representing the water department of the city and sheepmen of the state, will make an investigation of all sheep trails on the city's watersheds, according to a decision reached at a conference held yesterday in the office of Superintendent Charles F. Barrett of the water department. The investigation will be made next week and the committee will report June 3 to another conference in the superintendent's office.

Commissioner W. H. Kerns was absent from the meeting, being detained by illness in his family. Those present with Superintendent Barrett were C. B. Stewart, secretary, and James McAllister, a director, of the Woolgrowers association; J. S. Ostler of Nephi, a member of the state board of sheep commissioners; C. Frank Emery, state sanitary inspector; Arthur Cummings, foreman of the land and water department of the city, and E. S. Fernstrom, city right-of-way agent.

Plan for New Trail.

Mr. Fernstrom submitted to the meeting a plan for an entirely new sheep trail, leading through Salt Lake City into Davis county and thence over the mountains. This route is described as the Hardscrabble trail. The representatives of the sheepmen objected to this route as much longer than the present one and without facilities for watering the flocks. A counter proposition was advanced by Mr. McAllister, that the Big Mountain trail be used after being fenced in for the entire distance it parallels the creek, cleared of shrubbery to prevent the sheep from straying and the fence built so solidly as to prevent fifth being washed into the stream. The plan contemplates the sinking of stump holes at different points along the trail and the removal at frequent intervals of the fifth that is washed into these holes. Superintendent Barrett expressed himself as emphatically opposed to any compromise by which sheep may continue to be driven over the Big Mountain trail. He expressed the opinion that in ten years' time the sheepmen would be barred from the canyons. "You'll have to get an entirely new legislature," observed Mr. McAllister. "Too many of
