

CRUSHED OUT IN ELEVATOR SHAFT

Henry Crafts, Carpenter at Hotel Utah, Killed in Strange Manner.

CAUSE YET A MYSTERY Firemen Batter Wall in Futile Effort to Save Victim.

Henry Crafts, a carpenter, aged 51 years, was caught between the elevator and the second floor at the Hotel Utah yesterday morning and crushed so badly that he died half an hour after being taken to the L. D. S. hospital.

It was necessary to call out the firemen from the central station and batter down the wall of the elevator shaft before Crafts could be rescued from his horrible predicament. His body was wedged into a space that measured scarcely two inches in width.

Alone When Caught. The accident happened just before 9 o'clock. Crafts, who was employed as house carpenter at the hotel, was using a freight elevator to transfer material.

Death Comes Quickly. Crafts had lost consciousness when rescued. He was rushed to the hospital at the city building at 8 o'clock.

Cause Unexplained. Just how the accident happened is not certain. Chief Bywater advanced the theory that Crafts probably started the elevator before he was on it and then jumped aboard.
