"Greater love bath no man than this:" That a musician lay down a portion of his daily wage for railroad fare to attend orchestra rehearsals, out of which he receives nothing but gratification of delight in his art.

And this simply to introduce a few lines in respect of the sincerity and destricts are the passion when

And no matter how late on the previous night the musicians may have been engaged at their regular work. 10 o'clock Tuesday morning finds each man in his chair at K. of P. hall, ready for rehearsal.
