**Philharmonic Grows.**  
"Greater love hath no man than this." That a musician lay down a portion of his daily wage for railroad fare to attend orchestra rehearsals, out of which he receives nothing but gratification of delight in his art.

And this simply to introduce a few lines in respect of the sincerity and devotion exhibited by the musician when an object worthy his artistic pursuit is presented. The thought was brought out last week at a rehearsal of the Philharmonic orchestra, when the members rendered Wagner's "Tannhauser" averture, complete, and played four movements from Beethoven's Seventh symphony.

Sincerity in their work was evident among the orchestra's membership, and the excellent renditions of the selections designated bore proof that devotion and application are amply rewarded by the divine muse. Without doubt, no other local organization in years has played Tannhauser as the Philharmonic orchestra did at its rehearsal last Tuesday morning; and the spirited rendition shown in Beethoven's great symphony indicated a determination to give to this masterpiece a rendition equal to that accorded the better perfected overture of Wagner.

So much interest is displayed in the work of the orchestra that two of its members—one living at Ogden and the other at Provo—pay train fare out of their own pockets for the purpose of attending. And no matter how late on the previous night the musicians may have been engaged at their regular work, 10 o'clock Tuesday morning finds each man in his chair at K. of P. hall, ready for rehearsal.

As yet no intimation is given that a concert is in view. The men are simply engrossed in their musically work, having bent their determinations to perfecting themselves in a set of varied compositions just before them as an advance over the ordinary daily work of the instrumentalist. No venture in public as an organization is promised, either in the near or the distant future, although the orchestra has been in existence for six months. Simple devotion to the art divine is the present motive; whatever else time may bring forth. To date the membership of the orchestra is as follows:

## QUESTIONS LEGALITY OF TAX ASSESSMENT

Challenging the right of the city to make an extra assessment to cover cost of improvements not fully covered by the first assessment, L. Frank Branting yesterday filed suit in district court against the city to have declared null and void a certain ordinance by which such a special tax was assessed against his property. The suit is brought on behalf of property owners suffering from such assessments. Branting claims that he paid the regular assessment for laying of sewer past his property and that several months later the city passed another ordinance levying additional assessment. He refused to pay the latter tax and as a result property owners became clouded and seeks to have the cloud removed, ordinance made void and the assessment vacated.
