**UNCLE SAM WANTS GOOD CANDY MAKER**

Do you want to be one of Uncle Sam's "candy kids"? Although it is not generally known, the federal government manufactures candy, in connection with the work of the bureau of chemistry. If you are a candymaker you can take a civil service examination on January 8 for the position of laboratory helper in candymaking. The position pays \$200 per annum.

Examinations will also be held in the local federal building on that date for the following positions, the vacancies being for male applicants only: Scientific assistant in plant physiology; engineer and plumber; Indian service; assistant agriculturist in farm economics; bureau of plant industry.

**CITY LETS QUARTERS FOR THE LEGISLATURE**

### NO LONGER OPPOSES CLUB'S WATER PLAN

**Commissioner Korn is Now in Full Accord With the Recommendations.**

The rumored opposition of the city water officials to the recommendations of the Commercial club's special sanitation committee concerning water and means of safeguarding the city's water supply from contamination was dispelled yesterday afternoon at a conference between William Bowen, chairman of the committee, and W. H. Korn, water commissioner, and C. F. Barrett, superintendent of the water department.

The meeting was held in the office of the water commissioner. Yesterday noon Mr. Bowen called up Commissioner Korn on the telephone and complained of the commissioner's alleged remarks in a morning newspaper concerning the water committee's recommendations. Mr. Korn denied having made the objectionable remarks and retorted with the charge that the committee had reached its conclusions without conferring with the water department at any point. After a lengthy conversation by wire, a meeting was agreed upon to go over the full report of the committee.

"It was all a misunderstanding," declared the water commissioner after the meeting. "We opposed the recommendations of the committee because we didn't know just what they called for. We gathered an erroneous idea of the committee's plan and Mr. Bowen gathered an erroneous idea of our stand from the rather overcomplete newspaper report of my remarks on the question."

The chief point on which the misunderstanding was based was the recommendation of the Commercial club committee, that the sheep trails through the canyons be fenced. After reading the entire report, Mr. Korn declared he was in accord with the recommendations.

### SUPPLY FREE LIGHT FOR BRANCH LIBRARY

Free light will be furnished by the Utah Light & Railway company for the new public library on West North Temple street. In a letter to George E. Koser, commissioner of parks and public property, B. W. Mendell of the light company yesterday announced that the free service extended to the city in other buildings would be extended to the new public institution.

Mr. Mendell writes that though the company's franchise from the city does not specifically cover the question, he believes it was intended in its spirit to include free electricity for all such public uses.

**HONORS REQUISITION FOR ROBERT W. DAVIS**

After a hearing extending over two days, Acting Governor C. S. Tingey yesterday afternoon signed the order for the extradition of Robert W. Davis, wanted in Denver on a charge of failure to provide for his wife.

Davis sought to evade return to Denver on the ground that the Colorado state law pertaining to wife desertion was unconstitutional. The acting governor decided to grant the requisition and refer the point at issue to the Colorado courts. Davis is under arrest, but is out on bail. He will be taken to Denver today by M. F. Vismont, a deputy sheriff from the Colorado capital, who arrived last Saturday with the requisition papers.
