

SIN OF THORPE LIES
BEING FOUND OUT
Olympic Committee Cannot Take Back Trophies Until Next Formal Meeting.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—It will be impossible for the Olympic games authorities to accept the return of prizes which James Thorpe won in the all-around championship at the games in Stockholm until the full Olympic committee meets in Lausanne next summer, according to advice received here from Stockholm. Charges that Thorpe played professional baseball, to which he confessed, should have been made within thirty days after the Olympic games, according to the rules of the Stockholm contests, in order to have such charges formally recognized. It is believed that the only way to have the prizes recalled is to have the American amateur athletic union make a request to this effect at the next meeting of the Olympic committee.

Spotting authorities continue to comment sympathetically in the case of James Thorpe and are laudatory of the American athletic authorities who have reported the famous Indian athlete's disqualification as an amateur. In no quarter has there appeared any evidence of faulting the American over the discovery. "If America really wants to know the true British feeling towards Thorpe," says a writer in the Daily Mirror, "we can reduce the matter to a matter of Secretary Sullivan's outraged pulse. Britain is satisfied that Thorpe's victory was above board, even if Sullivan is not."

"If Thorpe was the only American who had transgressed the letter of the amateur laws, then in their army of athletes they have a wonderful collection," says a writer in the Daily Mirror. "No one who knows British athletics from the inside would for a moment imagine that none of our teams had taken payments sub-rosa in the way of expenses, and the difficulty is in getting proof of any wrong doing."

Thorpe Not Free Agent.
CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Managers of baseball teams who have been telegraphing and writing James Thorpe, the Indian athlete, for his terms now may begin all over again. Thorpe, it was announced today by President Ben H. Johnson of the American league, is not a free agent, but is under contract with the Fayetteville, N. C., club. Therefore it will be necessary to negotiate for his release through the owner of that club. Johnson received this information in a telegram from Secretary Farrell of the National association.

GERMANY WILL TAKE PART IN YACHT RACES
BOSTON, Jan. 30.—President-elect Wilson today notified the international committee that the winner's cup in this year's German-American Sander yacht races might be presented in his name.

The rules provide that the honorary donor shall be head of the government in the country where the races are held. The contents will be off Marblehead, beginning on August 26. The Eastern Yacht club furnishes the trophy.

Difficulties in Germany which threatened to make the races impossible this year have been overcome and the Kaiserlicher club will send three boats. German designers claimed it was impossible to build for \$1435 a Sander-type craft that would have a fair chance against the American. The cost limit was imposed by the emperor, but his majesty has now consented to a maximum expense of \$1650.

IMMODERATE CHEWING OF GUM INJURIOUS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—A warning against the excessive use of chewing gum was issued today to the 2500 athletes of the Y. M. C. A. by Dr. S. H. Greene, Jr., dean of the association's physical examination department.

"The immoderate use of chewing gum," said Dr. Greene, "may lead to some disciplinary and occasionally may also be a conducive cause of weak eyes. I don't mean to say that a large number of Y. M. C. A. athletes carry the practice of chewing gum all of themselves a vice, but some have. Gum chewing in moderation has very little or no ill effect and at times it may even help digestion, but the gum should be thrown away when the sweetness has left it, for by that time the papain, which is the beneficial part of the preparation, has been entirely exhausted."

This will be the first intercollegiate game of the season. As yet neither team has been defeated this year in preliminary games and both have played clever teams. It is almost certain that the teams which will win the final championship of the state will have to go through the season without a defeat. With four strong schools in the race this will be no easy feat.

It is true that the B. Y. C. men were playing in the high school class last year, but that does not mean that they are small or slow. They are as big, taken as a team, as most of the college teams in the country, and are exceedingly fast.

Peterson, the lanky center, was probably the best man at the place in the state last year and bids fair to be again this year. Of course, he will be unable to take the jumps away from "Olympic" Richards of Provo, but after the jumps he will be much faster than Richards and a much better basket tosser than the famous high jumper.
